HOME FURNISHING  
EXHIBIT AWAITEDWork Of Scandinavians and Swansons  
To Be Displayed At Cranbrook Pavilion

Birmingham and Bloomfield society folk are looking forward to the opening on Sunday of an exhibit of home furnishings and objects of art, at the Cranbrook Pavilion, under the auspices of Mr. and Mrs. Elie Saarnen and Mr. and Mrs. J. Robert F. Swanson. The exhibit will continue through May 27.

Visitors at the exhibit will have an opportunity of seeing "A Room for a Lady," which Mr. Saarnen designed for the 1915 Industrial Art Exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He has also designed centerpieces, vases in silver, and brass table decorations in the modern fashion.

The Swansons have concentrated on a living room ensemble which includes, besides furniture, rugs, tapestries and draperies which have been woven on the looms at Cranbrook. The piece de resistance in the room is the buffet which Mr. Saarnen designed. It is a piece of furniture that any of us would adore to have inlaid wood in beautiful pattern, makes up the cabinet which is on casters, making it possible to move it about, and upon opening it, we find brass shelves which are capable of holding all the necessary arrangements for serving liquid refreshments.

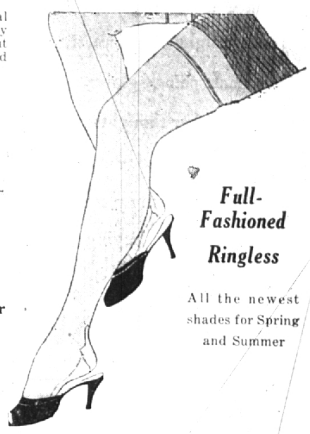
