TALK ON PUPPETS ENTERTAINS CLUB

Paul McPharlin Is Speaker At Meeting Of Birmingham Women's Group

Interesting highlights on the history of puppets, both in this and foreign countries, were told to members of the Birmingham Women's Club at a meeting Tuesday afternoon at Baldwin Public Library by Paul McPharlin, director of the Marionette Fellowship and instructor in puppetry at Wayne University.

Mr. McPharlin, a widely recognized authority in his field, emphasized the educational as well as entertainment values of puppet shows, and told how puppetry has been accorded a distinct revival of interest in this country in the past 15 years, due in large part, he said, to the activities of the famous Tony Sarg and his marionettes.

He described the differences in the various types of puppets, and illustrated his remarks with actual exhibits. Mrs. Walter L. Monland and Mrs. W. Clarence Wright were in charge of arrangements for the meeting.
