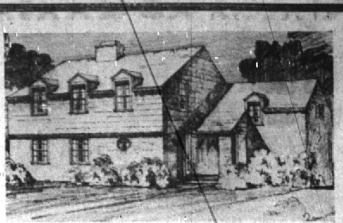
## Poetess To Address New Manuscript Club
