Involved In But One Serious Accident in 1935

Despite the fact that 4,519,173 miles were traveled and nearly three million passengers were carried, Eastern Michigan Motorbuses were involved in but one serious accident in the first ten months of 1935.

Reckless driving always is suicidal or murderous, declares Arthur Kierman, President of the Company, endorsing the state wide safety drive.

"Before we put a man behind the wheel of a motorbus or a truck, he must convince us that he is a sober, careful, considerate driver. Our one accident happened when a drunken motorist, driving seventy miles an hour, swerved from behind a line of cars and crashed head on into a Flint bound bus. "If drivers of private cars exercised the same care and judgment as do commercial drivers, many needless accidents would be avoided."
