CRANES BREAK LOSING STREAK

Defeat Unbeaten Howe Academy 19 to 14 Saturday At Cranbrook

A remarkably improved Blue and Gray team took the field for Cranbrook on Saturday and decisively ended a six-game losing streak by trouncing the unbeaten Howe Military Academy team 19 to 14. Paul Derriksen, Cranbrook's spectacular halfback, led the scoring with two touchdowns, while Jim Ruthenberg made the third and winning tally.

In the first quarter Howe, with the help of several penalties for Cranbrook, marched down the field behind the speedy running of Nourse, who scored the first tally of the game from the six-yard line. The second quarter found Cranbrook launching a powerful offensive which in a few minutes allowed Derriksen to score on an end run from the two-yard line. The remainder of the second quarter was a bit of a struggle, with an exhibition of football by both teams, although neither scored, and the half closed with Howe still in the lead 7 to 6.

Coach Raymond's Wildcats opened the third quarter with a series of passing attacks which left Howe gasping for air. On a series of tricky passing plays Howe advanced the ball in the fourth quarter to the 10-yard line where Nourse caught a pass to give Howe its second tally. Once again in this quarter Howe advanced the ball out of the passers' hand and enabled Cranbrook to recover it with only a few minutes to play. After several ineffectual line plunges, Andy Hinshaw made a brilliant run to midfield to end one of the most thrilling games ever played in the Cranbrook Oval.

The game as a whole, although marked by heavy penalties for both sides, was a great exhibition of good football and clean playing. Gabriel, Nourse and Snider starred for Howe, while Derriksen, Hinshaw, Morgan, and Ruthenberg did the work for Cranbrook.
