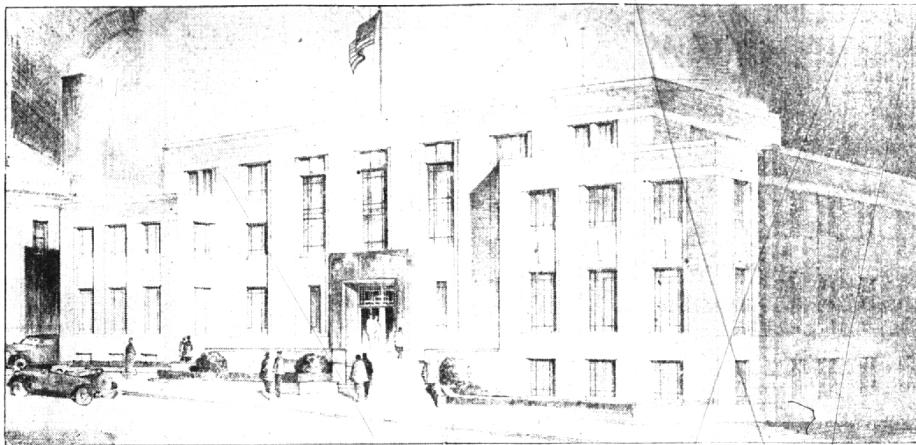

## SAFER DRIVING IN WINTER TIME

**Motorists And Pedestrians Aot To Be More Cautious Then**

Michigan drivers and pedestrians, on the basis of national figures, are safer in winter than in summer.

Ice and snow have been, for the most part, safety's strongest allies, due to the fact that two hazards inculcate in drivers a caution that thousands seem to lack when the weather is fine and the roads clear.

"Fine weather and clear roads seemingly lul the driver into a false sense of security," said Henry T. Ewald, publicity director of the State Safety Council's newly launched year-round campaign.

"Ice and snow sharpen his wits," Ewald said.

Tables compiled by the Travelers' Insurance Company reveal that the ratio of fatal accidents in rainy weather in 1934, or when snow was falling, to the total number of accidents, was lower than the average of all accidents combined.

In CLEAR weather, 744,419 persons in all were injured, 24,950 fatally.

In RAINY weather, there were 95,260, of which 2,610 were fatal; and in SNOWY weather the accidents totaled 23,810 and the deaths only 610.

Road conditions prevailing in last year's accidents were as follows:

**Accidents Fatal:**  
Dry surface 65,760 22,469  
Wet surface 141,420 4,571  
Snowy surface 30,870 870  
Ice surface 57,350 1,310

"The figures," says Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald, "only bear out the contention that many drivers are thrown off guard by apparently safe road conditions."

Winter produces a crop of accidents from causes and conditions peculiar to the season, never-

theless, the American Automobile Association points out.

In a statement on winter driving, it sounds this warning:

"Thousands of accidents are due to skidding, which in turn results from failure by motorists to allow for the covering of leaves that of ten carpets country roads, and urban lanes and city streets.

"We have numerous examples of the same failure to make allowance for slippery and sleety pavements.

"Good brakes, sound tires and chains are insurance—but maximum care and speed suited to the conditions are the only certain guarantees against this type of motor mishap.

"We have every winter a large group of accidents due to refusal of motorists to make allowance for poor visibility. Clean windshield, properly adjusted headlights and a conscious effort by motorists to slow themselves more time and a leisurely pace would do away with most of these accidents.

"There also is monoxide poisoning to be watched for, along with children skating and sledding on the streets. The monoxide could be avoided simply by opening the garage door before starting the motor."
