Fred R. Johnson To Discuss Mothers' Pensions In Oakland County

"How Michigan Can Qualify Under the Social Security Program," will be the subject of an address by Fred R. Johnson, secretary of the Michigan Children's Aid Society, before members of the Birmingham League of Women Voters at the Community House, Monday, Dec. 2, at 2 p. m.

Johnson will discuss the status of mothers' pensions, with special reference to Oakland County where the appropriation made for dependent mothers and children for 1936 will cover only a period of two or three months.

The program will be sponsored by the child welfare department, under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. K. Ormond.
