DETROIT WINS

Defeats Birmingham 14 To 0; St. Clair And Royal Oak Games Neat

The Birmingham football team bowed to a stronger and heavier aggregation at East Detroit last Saturday to the tune of 14 to 0. Injuries accrued from last week's game and the double wing back formation used by the Detroiters were set-backs for the Maples. There is no game scheduled for this week, which will give the team a well-needed rest before tackling St. Clair and Royal Oak the remaining games to be played. The Maroon and White boys will encounter the St. Clair team at Pierce field Friday, November 15, and Royal Oak there on Thanksgiving day.

The East Detroit boys marched from their own 30-yard line down the field for the touchdown and completed a pass to score the extra point. Foley, fullback, plunged over for the touchdown and also caught a pass from Williams, quarterback, to make the extra point. Midway through the third period they again marched down the field to cross the chalked line with a series of fake spinners and reverses.

Williams crashed through on an off-tackle play to score and Lamphreys raced around end for the extra point. They were on the Baldwin six-inch line late in the fourth period but failed to score.

The Baldwin lads were three times on the 8-yard line but were unable to score. The second time was the result of an 88-yard run by Don Porteous. A pass from Schack to Herbst was intercepted by Randall. In the fourth quarter the Maples worked their way up the field from their 20 to the 8-yard line. A pass from Rochelau to Mintling landed them on the thirty and a sleeper pass from Rochelau to Porteous found them on the 8-yard line where three passes over the goal was of no avail and the game ended thus.

Harrington, Baldwin back, was shifted to the line for the fourth quarter to furnish some defensive weight, because of the lack of substitutes with weight and experience.

ASKS INCREASE  
IN STATE POLICE

Olander Seeks Opinion Of  
Public On Safety Road  
Measure

Most Michigan municipalities have reduced, by strenuous campaigning, the number of traffic accidents in their municipalities to 18 per 100,000, but the rate on rural highways has gone up to 27 per 100,000.

Commissioner Oscar G. Olander, of the Michigan State Police, directs attention to this condition in a letter today sent to manufacturers, editors, Michigan Grange and a hundred other civic societies asking their opinion of a plan to increase the State Police personnel by 200 men.

"We have for years produced the machines that have reduced miles to minute," his letter reads. "We have built roads that have made rapid transportation comfortable. It is natural, we should be making such transportation safe. The State Safety Council's newly launched campaign is bound to result in the driving public's appreciation of the dangers which lurk behind the steering wheel."

Better enforcement of traffic laws in the cities is responsible, he believes, for the superior record as compared with rural communities. In the latter, he complains, available officers are far too few to permit extensive preventive work. With their multitude of duties, the present 200 uniformed State Police, according to Commissioner Olander, seldom reach the scene until the accident is over and are on patrol too small a time to take preventive steps. It is manifestly impossible, he says, for a force the present size to supervise efficiently the 9,000 miles of improved trunk line highways and over 70,000 miles of country roads in the state.

Olander would make the fee \$2 for the privilege of operating a motor car in Michigan for three years, the revenue to be placed in a continuing fund for the maintenance of the State Police, including enlargement of the staff by the desired 200. He notes that an annual balance of \$491,000 has been turned back into the General Fund from the revenue received from the operators' and chauffeurs' licensing law since it took effect May 1, 1931.

A fee increase to \$2, he writes, "would prove for proper examination of applicants for licenses by having the commissioner of State Police appoint local agencies, together with members of his own department, to conduct such examinations."

"Many drivers who are incompetent, physically or otherwise, would be removed from the highways. Additional highway patrol would be provided. Examination of drivers, inspections of equipment and administering of existing traffic laws would then be daily routine."

Moreover, highway patrol by uniformed officers has a psychological effect in regulating traffic and reducing crimes. Second, through the enforcement of traffic laws, the stopping of motorists and inspecting of credentials, many criminals have been caught. Guarding against minor infractions has led many times to the uncovering of major criminal operations."

The Works Progress Administration recently approved a \$500,000 building program which will provide ample quarters in at least 29 counties for such an augmented force.
