A.A.U.W. Plans Program To Aid College Students

Since 1920, the Birmingham Branch of the American Association of University Women has been cognizant of an important fact. It is that the boy and girl approaching college age stand in need of intelligent guidance and accurate information in the matter of continuing their education. To meet this need, the branch maintains a committee on college information, which outlines each year a guidance program conforming as closely as possible to the changing social order and the present day trends in education.

Mrs. James J. Reilly, Jr., chairman of the committee for this year, announces a program, which will provide constructive aid to potential college students, as well as to the boy and girl who plan to remain at home.

The first of several objectives included in the plan, will be to offer the most up-to-date information about schools and colleges in which students are interested, including both scholarship requirements and economic costs. To

make this information easily available, college catalogs will be placed in Baldwin Public Library and in the library at Baldwin High School.

Parents seeking advice in planning the future education of their sons and daughters, are invited to consult members of the branch, which is composed of representatives of 61 different colleges and universities. Each will be prepared to discuss requirements and qualifications of her alma mater.

Members of the branch who have had experience in various types of vocational work, will seek to determine the vocational interests of upper classmen. As a means to the end of assisting young men students, a personnel

committee will be formed of hands of A. A. U. W. members. This committee of men will be ready to confer with students whose problems are outside the reach of school facilities.

The committee will also compile a list of scholarships available throughout the United States. In addition to this program, the subject of college information will be the topic of an address to be delivered at the January meeting by some well informed speaker.

The final event of the year will be a style show to be staged in the late summer of 1936, when fashions for college students will be modeled. Invitations to the show will be extended to the senior class in high school and to the graduates of June 1936 and their mothers.

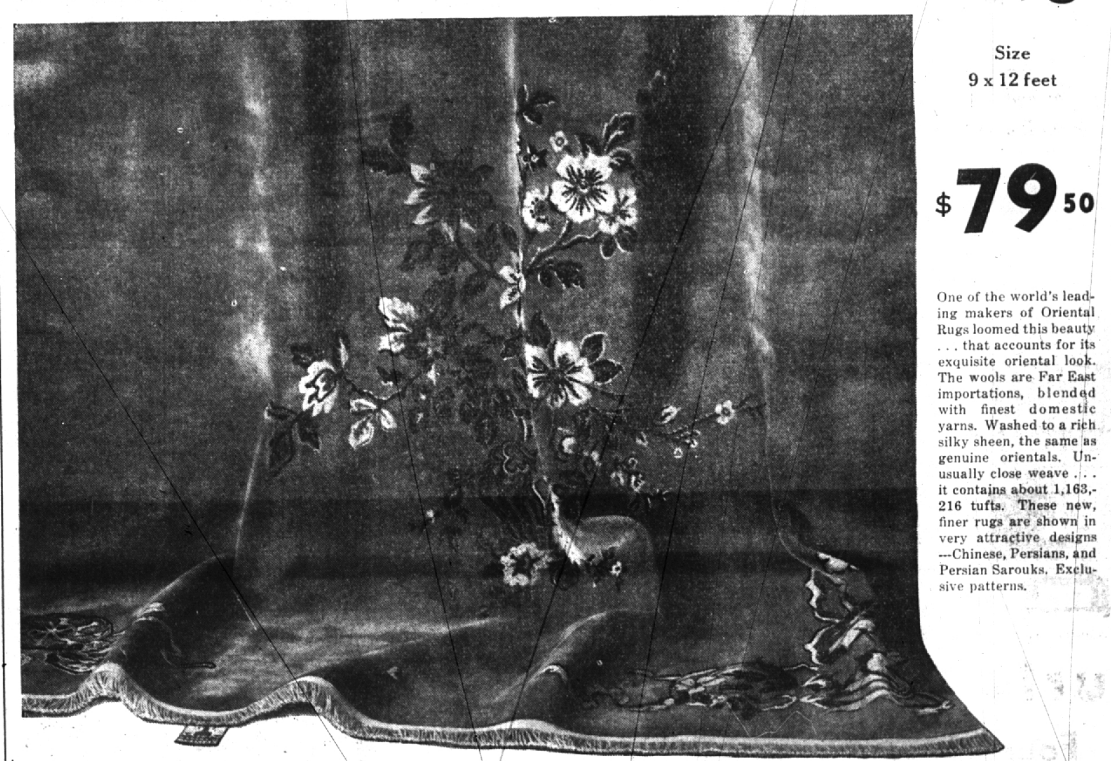

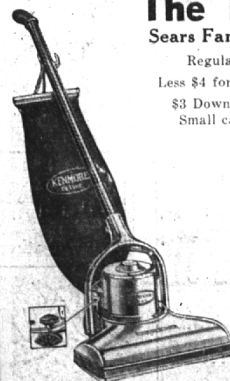

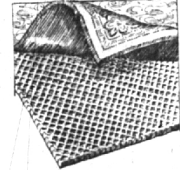
