## Readers Offered Choice Of 3000 Books At Annual Sale

Approximately 3,000 volumes for Birmingham's perusal were placed upon the counters and shelves at 176 West Maple avenue Monday for the annual book sale sponsored by the Birmingham Branch of the American Association of University Women. At the close of the first day, 973 volumes, including both works of fiction and non-fiction embracing a wide variety of subjects, had been sold.

According to members of the several committees assisting the sale is one of the most successful ever conducted in Birmingham. Donations were varied and generous, and the titles covered a wide field of interest. Among books contributed were first editions and volumes to appeal to the collector's taste, and general fiction ranging from the heaven-home-and-mother school of Harold Bell Wright to the more sophisticated authors of this and other generations.

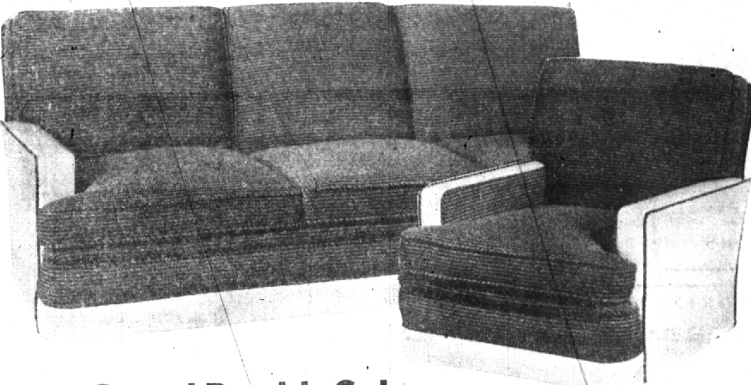
