Pilot International Club of Business Women." In addition to the program, there will be a business meeting and election of officers.

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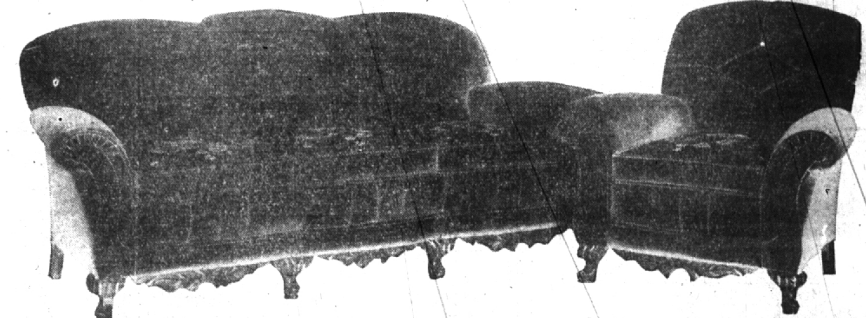
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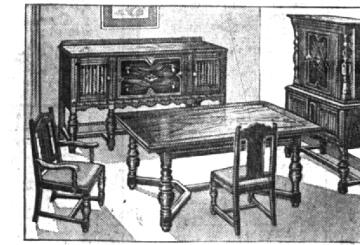
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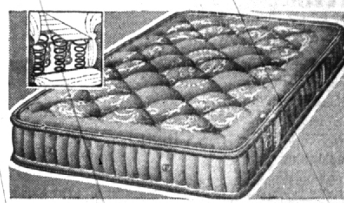
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
