State Convention In
Ann Arbor

It will take just five reels of motion picture film to cruise around the world, Tuesday afternoon, when members of the Birmingham Women's Club will be conducted on a visual world-tour by Henry Kohring, manager of a Detroit branch of a steamship line.

Mr. Kohring will speak informally as views are shown of various cities in far off lands. Invitation is extended by the club to all women interested in attending the meeting.

Mrs. John S. Black, president and delegate to the recent convention of the Michigan State Federation in Ann Arbor, will discuss resolutions and proceedings of the convention.

Mrs. Caroline Uptegraft will be chairman of the day, and Mrs. C. A. Bowles will act as hostess.

Birth Control Resolution Stated For Discussion Here

The resolution endorsing dissemination of birth control information under "scientific regulation" will form the major topic of discussion at the morning session of the Oakland County Federation of Women's Clubs, which will meet Friday at the Community House at 10 a. m. Mrs. Albert P. Peppers, chairman of the legislative department, will present the resolution as it was adopted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs at the triennial convention in June, and by the Michigan State Federation at its recent convention in Ann Arbor.

Mrs. Peppers will lead discussion of the resolution, but it is not expected that the County League will voice its opinion in an official vote at this meeting.

Another resolution adopted by the State Federation to be presented to the county group is one in support of the stand taken by Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald regarding the "opium system."

The legislative session will open an all-day program in which several of the departments will participate. Luncheon will be another feature of the day. At the morning session also, the music department will offer as its contribution, an address on "How Music Affects Every Day Life" by Mrs. H. S. Ellis of Holly, former president of the Oakland County Federation.

"Stars Look Down" by A. J. Cronin will be the subject of a book review by Mrs. J. H. Tracy of Grand Oak, which will open the afternoon session. Mrs. Charles J. Shan will represent the department of book review.

An interesting feature at 2:15 p. m. will be the presentation of the geographic situation in the Mediterranean.
