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Doris Fitch Becomes Bride At Impressive Ceremony

The romantic beauty of the Renaissance was recreated for the first time in the history of Bloomfield Hills nuptials, in the lovely robes worn by Miss Doris Fitch, when Doris became the bride Saturday evening of Charles E. Latham, son of Mrs. Charles K. Latham. The ceremony was read in the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Fitch, Jr., of Cranbrook road.

Reminiscent of the period of the Medici, was the bridal robe of flower-patterned silver and ivory brocade, fashioned with long sweeping lines from the shoulder to the floor. A standing collar distinguished the square neckline of the gown, which was fitted at the waist and hipline by horizontal tucks, and then fell to the floor in lustrous folds. Numerous small buttons adorned the sleeves, which were puffed to the elbow, and the same buttons extended the length of the gown in front. A long court train was formed by the folds of the skirt. Like a fine white mist, her voluminous tulle veil outlined her figure, reaching beyond the end of the train. The veil was held in place by a coronet trimmed with seed pearls. She carried a bouquet of carnations, tied with lilacs of the valley and lined with silver and satin streamers.

The same period was reflected in the gown of Miss Barbara Fitch, who was her sister's only attendant.

The ceremony was followed by a chrysanthemum, larkspur, gladioli and snow on the mountain.

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
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
