## CONTRACT BRIDGE

Written For Central Press and The Birmingham Eccentric

THE VARIOUS sound reasons for making opening bids upon minimum strength, as either dealer or second hand to show better than average defensive strength, whether it is concentrated chiefly in a suit or divided among at least three suits, to encourage partner's bidding, to minimize opposing trump and to disclose the best defense against them, vanish after partner has passed and you opportunity to bid reaches you either third or fourth hand.  
The above remarks apply with followers of the usual accidental type of game commonly favored in this part of the world, and best adapted to our general trend of thought. Some 20 years ago, when I first proposed the original type of game, which included passing powerful hands as dealer or second hand, and making light opening bids as third or fourth hand, to provide for cases where partner had not been previously mentioned, Mr. White abandoned it as less efficient than regulation tactics. Like psychic bids and other deceptive tactics,
