The Baldwin high school track team opened its 1936 season with an auspicious victory over the squad representing Berkley High School by a score of 53 1/2 to 50 1/2 Thursday at Royal Oak. The meet, as the score indicates, was close throughout. Berkley seized an early lead by sweeping the shot and 220 dash events, but the Maroons, strong in the jumps, came back late in the meet to overcome a 20 point lead and sweep the broad and high jumps.
