

**Miss Grether Is Made Director Of Church Education**

Last Sunday it was announced the First Presbyterian Church of Detroit has accepted the resignation of Miss Grether, director of the local Presbyterian Church of Christian Education since September first. Miss Grether received her degree of Bachelor of Arts from Eastern College and after three years of study in the field of Bible and Religious Education graduated from the Philadelphia Training School. Miss Grether comes to Birmingham with seven years of experience in the Bedford Avenue Church. She has participated on the faculty of a number of summer conferences for Presbyterian young people. Feeling the need to devote particular attention to youth, the First Presbyterian Church decided to add to its staff a capable leader to enlarge the program of the church but to maintain its present policy of Bible-centered instruction. Miss Grether will give attention to all youth work programs and will endeavor to encourage youth and adults in church sponsored program of Christian education.

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**"Sha-was-kee-penesee" Means "Green Bird"**  
And 65 Bu. Per Acre of Seed Corn Means Profit On Land He Once Owned

The farm owned by Walter C. Gremel of Sebewaing, Huron County, Mich., has been cultivated continuously since 1852, ever since the grandfather of the present owner bought it from the Indian Sha-was-kee-penesee, the Chippewa equivalent for "Green Bird." In spite of the eighty-four years of interrupted cropping, Mr. Gremel's land produced a crop of 65 bushels per acre of excellent quality seed corn last season. A careful soil building program with AA quality fertilizer is the secret of his success. "I hold the original grant by which the United States Government first granted this land to Sha-was-kee-penesee (meaning "Green Bird") of the Chippewa tribe on Oct. 10, 1847," Mr. Gremel wrote to the American Agricultural Chem-
