BITS ON BRIDGE

Finding a Fit

One of the valuable assets needed to become a good contract player is imagination. Any game must have its rules but book players seldom scale the heights of imagination in bridge are laid down to guide you in general but no conceivably cover the millions of card combinations that can occur. The imaginative player is aware of this fact and constantly tries to visualize what his partner's holding is and how it will dovetail with his own cards.

Assume your partner opens the bidding with one Club and second hand opponent passes. You hold:

♠ A ♣ None ♦ KQxxx ♣ Kxxx

According to the rules, your hand is not strong enough to force the bidding because you do not hold three honor tricks. Yet a recent job of the cards should tell you that, unless partner's Club bid was a psychic, there should be a small slam in the two hands. In this instance, distribution has more than made up for insufficient honor strength. You should bid two Diamonds and force partner to bid to game at least. If he holds the Ace of Diamonds and the Ace of Clubs for his bid then a grand slam is a laydown.

Again, assume that after three passes you have to decide on whether or not to bid this holding:

♠ J10xxx ♠ Axxx ♦ None ♣ KQ

Your hand counts only two honors, but it should be opened with one Spade because you can strongly support any bid partner makes, except Diamonds. The fact that you hold strength in both major suits is another important factor as it means opponents cannot go to game. Probably it is thought by some that fourth hand in order to open the bidding after three passes, must have a powerful holding. The only factor that governs opening bids by the last hand is:
