POLICE RADIO SUGGESTED TO CITY COUNCIL

Commission Gets Proposal For Summer Recreation Program Here

Appointing a committee to investigate the advantages of police radio equipment, selecting two additional members of the Board of Recreation, adopting a resolution giving economy in all municipal affairs and discussing with Y. M. C. A. representative a recreational program, were some of the matters handled by the city commission at their meeting Monday night in the Municipal Building.

Mayor Martz presided at the session. Russell McBride, president of the local Retail Merchants Association, appeared before the commission and requested additional relief of Birmingham stores, claiming that the association is justified in making such a request in view of the recent holding of a drug store here. Mr. McBride, who holds a commercial radio operator's license, volunteered after the commission and police department in any way possible in the matter of obtaining police radio equipment.

The advantages of installing police radio equipment were discussed after Commissioner Wilmer Moody asked for an explanation of the matter. Following a suggestion that the city manager investigate the situation, the commission passed a resolution pledging itself to all due economy in governmental affairs.

At the suggestion of Commissioner Lawrence Hulbert, made after Police Chief John P. Mackett appeared before the commission, explaining the function of the department for the benefit of the newly elected members. He demonstrated throughout the city and he showed how the three functions to attain the maximum efficiency.

Two representatives of the Y. M. C. A., Robert Lynde and Raymond Pack, appeared before the commission, presenting a proposal for a summer recreational program for the city, the school children and the Y. M. C. A. The plan proposed that money, materials, labor and machinery be supplied, grade and condition the playing fields by the city, in addition to slides, building and equipment for the schools. It was further suggested that an agency be created to promote and direct the raising of funds and execution of the program by the "Y". Commissioner A. Palmer was appointed to confer with representatives of other groups interested in the proposition. In connection with recreation work, the commission voted to finance the supply water for the swimming pool at Barnum school over an eight week period.

Treasurer H. H. Corson reported that \$3,000 in bonds exchanged had been received Monday. This figure brings the total bonds exchanged to over \$133,000.

Two members of the Board of Review were elected to serve with Donald C. Egbert, City Assessor and Building Inspector. They are Louis Hascall and Walter Connolly. Robert McClelland was nominated but defeated in the ballot.

A resolution was sent the commission from Secretary J. B. Howarth of the Library board of directors, in which a request was made for \$13,000 to operate the library from July 1 of this year until July of 1936. The resolution was placed on file.

The city manager was authorized to expend not in excess of \$125 for the city's annual cleanup week which will begin on May 18.
