Birmingham before today

Mr. and Mrs. Alex Parks lived in the house north of the Dunaldon home in the early 60's. They had two sons and a daughter. The eldest son Austin was the husband of Estella Barrett. She was the only daughter of Mrs. Zina Parks. Her first husband, second husband, James Parks, was a well known figure in Birmingham.

The Brays had two sons, Warren and Stanley and a daughter Elizabeth Edgar A. Parks is the husband of Mrs. Ella Johnson "Jays" Michigan and Mrs. John Bray first air teacher was her aunt, Mrs. Sarah Beddow Aldrich. Mrs. Aldrich was the wife of Professor J. J. Beddow, of Mount Pleasant and Mrs. Alfred Johnston.

After Mr. and Mrs. Alex Parks moved to their home on the west side of Woodward, their former home became the Austin Parks' home. It was here that Stella was born in 1889. Her father had a large circle of friends and was especially interested in town improvement.

I believe that Miss Jennie Taylor, afterwards the wife of the father of Eva, Louise and Charlie Schlack, lived in the next home. This was later the home of William Brown and family, who afterwards lived on the south side of M. Hill Street between Bates and Chester, in 1889.

Mr. and Mrs. Armeron Whitehead lived in the next home and remodeled it into a very modern home.

When I was a child a row of peach trees grew on the front lot line, just inside of the fence, and many were the fashions yellow peaches I ate from those old peach trees.

Mrs. Whitehead was the former Mrs. Emma Beddow and the mother of Raymond Whitehead. Mr. Whitehead was a partner in the firm of Whitehead and Mitchell, the first President of the old Exchange Bank of Birmingham and was one of the owners and founders of The Birmingham Eccentric. I believe that Ray Whitehead was born in the house on the east side of Peter Street, near Martin that is now owned by Mr. Irving Bailey and is occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Schlaack at present.

Glenn and his sister Bessie are the children of Mrs. M. S. Charles Schlaack. Mr. Schlaack was at one time the owner of the hardware store which is now owned by Mr. Elmer Hays.

Charles Schlaack was the brother of Frank and Phillip Schlaack and I believe that he was an intimate friend of the late Charles Stenched.

Mrs. Hattie Schlaack is a Post-Workshop member of the O. E. S. of Birmingham.

The last house on the east side of Woodward and south of Maple Avenue was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Brownell's father, Amasa Davies, one of Birmingham's first residents. The front wing of the house was used for a general store. The residence was the two-story house on the east side of the store section. Charlie Griffin was a son of Mrs. Davies' daughter and after the death of his parents he made his home with the Brownells. I have heard told that as a child he was not allowed to play with other children but was expected to play on the large Brownell lawn. The lawn was enclosed by a high board fence, except at the open porch in front of the store. Charlie Griffin did compete and played in the town band. He was a partner by trade, Harry and Ray Griffin are his sons.

Finally the Brownells moved to Detroit and the Merrills occupied the Brownell house. The Merrills were the parents of Gertrude, Bessie, John, Elma and Charles. Mrs. Merrill was a very handsome woman and she and Mr. Merrill were popular residents of the town.

When we had our first Hill reunion in 1928, Mrs. Merrill had several of the children attend in the reunion, much to the delight of the other Birmingham friends. I understand that John Merrill is in business in Chicago at present.

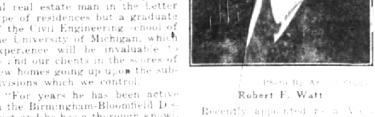

I thought of the story to one of my school mates and, unbeknown to me, he got it and showed it to JOHN. He was very angry about it and threatened to have me arrested and taken to jail.
