

LOCAL THINCLADS BEAT CRANBROOK

Maple Tracksters Grab 11 Firsts in Humbling Cranes, 82-22

Revenge is sweet, and sweet it was indeed for the Baldwin high school tracksters as they romped over the Cranbrook thinclads Friday night, April 24, to the tune of 82 to 22. The Cranes' basketball five, one of the best hereabouts, defeated the Maroon quintet during the cage season, and when the Maple track squad journeyed to Cranbrook last week, it was with the express purpose of avenging that loss. Birmingham took first in every event except the shot put, the only event in which it did not place. Not only did the Maples grab eleven firsts, but they won many seconds and several thirds.

The two hurdles events were won as before by Cary and Bud Herbst. The Maroon's top hurdler, took first place in both. Wayman showed that he was back in form by grabbing first in both dashes. Carey raced off with the quarter mile, and Herb built earned his letter by snatching first in the half mile. Junior Hoover, the Maple ace miler, took a vacation and finished in a three way tie with Davis and Erwin for first in the long run. Hoover walked part of the way and all three Maroon men lapped the nearest Cranee man a quarter of a lap.

Hoffman placed first at the shot for Cranbrook. Thomas and McCarthy tied for first the high jump. Birmingham swept the broad jump, McBride, Thomas, and Reed finishing in that order. McBride vaulted over 11 feet to capture first in the pole vault, and Porteous also got up to the eleven foot marker. And for the first time this season, Birmingham placed a good relay team on the field, and won this race.

MAROON 9 BOWLS TO ROYAL OAK, 6-0

Friday's Game Brings Out Locals Best Play Of Season

In the best game played this year thus far, Baldwin high school's baseball team was the victim of hot breaks and a strike-out wizard, and as a result they dropped their third contest of the season, losing to the Royal Oak team nine by a 6-0 score. The game was played on the Maroon diamond at Springdale Park Friday night, April 24, Collins and Bubb were the opposing pitchers, and both hurled fine games. Up to the seventh inning, Collins had allowed two runs and four hits. Bubb no runs and three hits. With two out in the first of the sixth, and Collins on first for Royal Oak, Bubb hit a screaming line drive that struck Collins on the elbow of his pitching arm, and carried off toward third. Bob Thompson picked up the ball and threw Bubb out, but the damage was done to Collins' arm. He lost his stuff as a result of the injury, and after allowing hits to each of the first two men up in the Acorn half of the seventh, he was replaced by Al Jones, who allowed two more runs and two more hits.

Both teams had men on in the first, but neither scored. Royal Oak was retired in order in the second, and, though Minting led off with a hit, the fourth for Birmingham. Neither team scored in the third, nor in the fourth. In the fifth inning, Royal Oak combined errors by Thompson and Korster and Minting, a base on balls, a hit, and a wild pitch to score two runs. After C. Giddings and Bubb had gone out, Chamberlain reached first on Bob Thompson's error, went to second when Ladue walked, both men advanced when Forster failed to hold the ball, and scored on D. Giddings' single. Warren got a life on Minting's error, but was forced at third on Joyce's roller. Minting led off in the sixth, but was caught by Birmingham in their half of the fifth. Petera reached first on a single but was unable to advance. Neither team

scored in the sixth. In the final chapter, Chamberlain touched off the fireworks with a ringing single. Ladue advanced him to second with another single. D. Giddings fled to Fourare in right. Warren walked, filling the bases. At this point, Jones came in from center field to pitch and Freddie Zimbauer replaced him. Joyce fled to Fourare in right. Gerhardt singled, scoring Chamberlain and Ladue. Warren went to third and Gerhardt to second on a wild pitch. Hughes walked. C. Giddings scored. Warren and Gerhardt with a single. Bubb hit a hard ground ball at short. Jones tried to throw for the final out. Both then struck for the rest of the Maroon's half of the seventh.

Collins allowed six hits and four runs, walked four men, and pitched five. Bubb allowed three hits and no runs, walked one man, and struck out thirteen. Maroon batsmen, Jones allowed two hits and two runs, walked one, and made one wild pitch. No balls were hit for extra bases. Gerhardt, Chamberlain, and Ladue all collected two hits for Royal Oak.

The Maroon netters did not lose a single match, sweeping three singles events and both doubles matches. The team members, picked last week, are Capt. Hubert, George Frey, and Lloyd Forster, singles players, and Halton Drury and Steve Wyzant on doubles team, and George Lawler and Ned Stark the other combination. Coach Robinson has arranged a schedule for the team, consisting of nine matches.

At Wayne, Hubert defeated Conroy—6-2; 6-0. Frey won over Crawford—6-0; 6-0. Forster downed Dendel—6-1; 6-1. Drury and Wyzant beat Jones and Armstrong—6-1; 6-2. Lawler and Stark defeated Rogers and Callahan—6-1; 6-2.

Anyone in school desiring to make the team may attempt to do so by challenging either the number 3 singles man or by two players, challenging the number 2 doubles team. The challengers must beat the team players two out of three sets. They will then take their place on the team. The team member, if defeated, may after the next inter-school match challenge his competitor until he has been played.

The next match will be with Cranbrook at Cranbrook School, April 25. Five single matches and two double matches will be played. The 1936 term schedule will be April 25, Wayne at Wayne—3 singles, 2 doubles.

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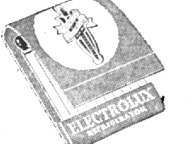
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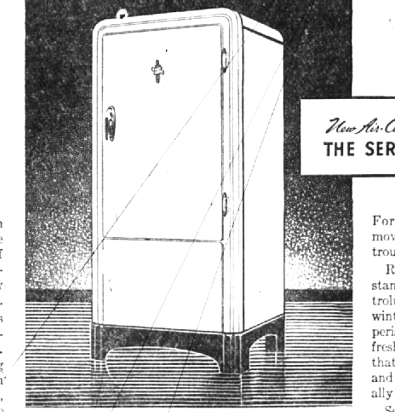
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
