Dainties To Prepare For the Easter Table

Chicken Omelet

Beat the whites of 4 eggs until dry; beat the yolks until light colored. Add to the beaten yolks 4 tablespoons of boiling water, 1-1/2 teaspoon salt, a dash of pepper and beat again. Cut and fold the whites into the yolk mixture until thoroughly blended.

Baked Ham Loaf

Order 1 pound of fresh ham and 1-2 pound of smoked ham ground very fine, add 1-2 cup of milk, 2 well beaten eggs, 1/2 cup of soft bread crumbs, 2 teaspoons of chicken fat, 1/2 teaspoon of lemon rind, 3-4 teaspoon of salt and 1-2 teaspoon pepper.

Easter Salad

Smooth a cream cheese with a fork and gradually add enough cream to make a stiff paste. Divide into portions for different colors. Use nut meats in one, mashed yolk of a hard boiled egg in another, finely chopped beets in another. Color with vegetable coloring. Shape into small eggs. Make nests of shredded lettuce and in them place the colored eggs. In serving, pass the mayonnaise.

Angel Food Dessert

Slices of angel food Vanilla ice cream Canned pear halves Fresh salted almonds If the cake is very stale, moisten with the pear juice. Place a slice of ice cream on each portion of cake and top with half of an almond. Into which strips of salted almonds have been placed porcine-fashion.

Chocolate Souffle

2-1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate 1 cup milk 2 tablespoons butter, melted 2 tablespoons flour 1-3 cup sugar 3 eggs Add chocolate to milk and beat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, heat with rotary egg beater until thickened. Blend with flour and add chocolate mixture slowly, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from fire. Combine sugar and well beaten egg yolks. Add chocolate mixture stirring vigorously. Cook, fold in well beaten egg whites. Turn into well greased baking dish. Place in pan of hot water and bake in oven at 350 degrees for 30 to 60 minutes. Serve with—

Marshmallow Mint Sauce

1-2 cup sugar 1-4 cup marshmallows cut in small pieces 1 egg white stiffly beaten 1-4 teaspoon of pecan nut extract Green coloring Cook sugar and water to a thin syrup. Add marshmallows. Let stand until marshmallows are dissolved. Pour syrup slowly over egg whites, heating constantly until mixture is cool. Add peppermint extract and enough coloring to make a delicate green.
