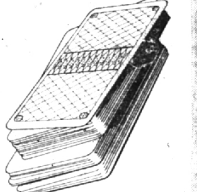

A comprehensive investigation ordered to serve a companion measure to the recently adopted building code was referred to the Village Council for its approval. Monday night, Action was deferred to give the commissioners opportunity to study the measure in detail.

Registration Notice

to Residents of the City of Birmingham For General Primary Election, TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 1936

To vote at this election, all persons must be registered in the City by Saturday, September 5th, 1936, at 5 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham twenty days at the time of voting are eligible.

TO REGISTER, call at the City Clerk's office in the Municipal Building or before Saturday, September 5th, during business hours. The City Clerk's office will be open WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 26th, from 8 A. M. until 8 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

Any registered elector who has moved since he last voted, may cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer at any time before WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 26th, at 8 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

Persons who are now registered under the Permanent Registration system, in the City of Birmingham need not re-register. Any person who has not voted since November, 1932, and who has not re-instated his registration, must re-register by September 5th.
