#### Silver Jubilee Convention Of Exchange Clubs Will Start August 30

Charles A. Berkey, Detroit, founder of the first Exchange Club, and Harold M. Hartley, Toledo, National Secretary of Exchange Clubs, will receive special recognition at the Silver Jubilee Convention of The National Exchange Club, scheduled for August 30 through Sept. 2 in the Book Cadillac Hotel, according to information received by President Manley R. Bailey of the Birmingham Exchange Club.

The two honored service club leaders are the only living founders of The National Club, a nationwide, non-commercial organization of business and professional men.

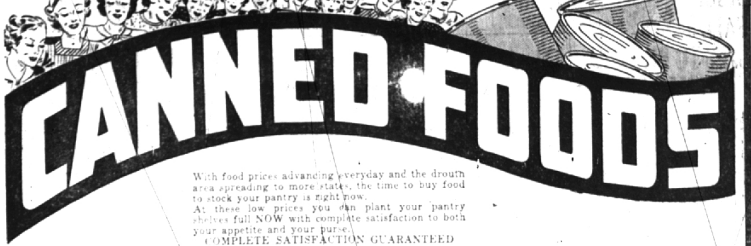
