## "Yellow Jack" Choice of Players For January Guest Performance

Village Players have stepped courageously from the beaten path of dramatic productions, in choosing for their public performance in January, Paul de Kruif's "Yellow Jack," the stirring drama that has opened new vistas in the theater by combining originality of idea with the strikingly uncommon in methods of presentation.

"Yellow Jack" will be presented for Players only Saturday evening, Jan. 23, and on Sunday, Jan. 24, for guests. Dr. J. B. Hassinger, who played one of the leads in "Yellow Jack" last summer when it was successfully produced by the Brattleboro (Vermont) Players, under the direction of Paul Stephenson, will direct the performance for the Players. He will be assisted by Warren Pease, Jr., and Mrs. Charles D. McCall, who will be in charge of costumes and properties.

The play is a decided departure from the conventional forms of dramatic writing. There are no acts, but a series of scenes presented in rapid succession by changes in lighting effects. The simultaneous action of the drama will be enacted by means of a two level stage. On the upper level a laboratory will be shown, and on the lower will be presented closely woven episodes of the play.
