Perhaps he had been taken to the other end without warning, the bell rang, the whistle blew, and the train was leaving and nothing had happened. Embarrassment, surprise and unquestioning disappointment showed on the faces that turned to look in all the other takes in the group. The time had been wasted, the Prince gone—and so were any chances of viewing the Prince."

Pittsburgh-Washington Game May Avenge Old Rose Bowl Losses for Panthers

ONCE more the cry of "Westward Ho!" echoes round the University of Pittsburgh campus. Selection of the Panthers to co-star with Washington in the New Year Day presentation of the colorful Rose Bowl affair gives the Smiley City eleven a chance to avenge three previous setbacks at this blue ribbon event of the grid world.

Pitt's first trip to the Pacific slope, in 1922, ended in a 7 to 6 defeat at the hands of Stanford, which wasn't so bad. But the results of the next two encounters were much more decisive—and humbling—for Pitt.

Southern California's Trojans administered both defeats, trouncing the Panthers 47 to 14 in 1920, and repeating in 1925 with a resounding 25 to 0 spanking.

NEITHER Washington nor Pitt has a perfect record for the 1936 season. The Huskies undoubtedly are

the strongest outfit of the West Coast, however, despite a tie and a defeat. They dropped their first game to Minnesota, which is no disgrace, considering the caliber of the Gophers.

They came out fast following that defeat, winning four in a row. C. L. A., Oregon State, California, Oregon, Southern California, Washington State, and Utah Stanford.

Pitt also is charged with a loss and a tie. After crushing Ohio Wesleyan, West Virginia, and Ohio State in three successive trips, the Panthers seemed to be well on the road to a perfect season. They were halted by many experts as the wonder team of the year.

Then, to make life forebodingly long and bad, Pitt fell before Duquesne, its city rival, 7 to 0. Pitt lunched back into the win column the following week, beating Notre Dame 26 to 0, but the next Saturday could get only a 0 to 0 tie with Fordham.

FROM this point on, the Panthers went on a winning streak and closed the regular season with a 10-1 record. They were the champions of the Pacific Coast, New England, and the South.

But at the end of this season, a certain group found its way to the grid world and Pitt's participation in the game. Pitt rose still but fell in the strongest grid team-out of the Mississippi, Bath, Alabama and Louisiana State have gone through the Blue Mountains without a loss. Each has been tied.

Louisiana State in particular is well thought of because of its victory over Tulane.

But talk as they may, it's still Coach Jimmy Phelan and his Washington teammates, starting "Big" Haines, Jimmy Cain, Elmer Long, and Ed Noworodski, and Jack Sutherland's eleven. Pitt's high outfit, featuring Bob La Rue and Maxwell Goldberg, who will provide the excitement on New Year's Day at Pasadena.

(Continued from Page One) operator, with office in Detroit denied knowledge of any impending plans for construction of a suitable Post Office for this community, but admitted that there was a possibility of such work getting under way within two weeks.

Birmingham is rated as a first class post-office and is eligible for a government building, providing available funds are appropriated. There are two ways of obtaining such an appropriation, one being for the government to undertake the project as a work relief program and the other for the Senate or Congress to appropriate this section to introduce a bill of Congress asking for such a building.

Since a work relief project here is highly desirable, The Eccentric feels that the best chance for success lies in local citizens writing to their congress man, nationally Representative George A. Donnelly of Royal Oak, and urging him to introduce a bill before the legislative body.

This community lost an opportunity to secure a new postal building this year when Rochester was allotted funds for a new Post Office by the Federal Government.

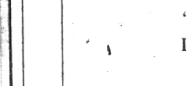
