Spicy Evergreens Hail Visitors To Garden Unit's Yuletide Show

The spicy scent of evergreens greeted those entering the auditorium of the Community House Monday afternoon, to attend the annual Christmas greens exhibit of the Birmingham unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association.

The exhibit, one of the most original and enjoyable in the unit's history was attended by a large gathering of women, including members of the hostess unit, their honor guests, members of the Birmingham Hills unit, and other guests.

Around the evergreen trees, which formed the central decoration, were groups of tables arranged for a variety of occasions. There were formal dinner tables, breakfast trays, even to the small table for the child's holiday party.

Occasional tables offered suggestions for brightening eyes corners during the gayest season of the year, and lovely centerpieces offered a variety of new ideas to the hostess planning holiday parties. One of the most unusual exhibits, which won the blue ribbon for its class, was the wreath adorned with dainty, multi-colored winter fare for the table, designed and entered by Mrs. Alfred J. LaBelle. With a background of greens, the wreath was trimmed with ornaments made of feathers and other things of the forest.

Stars were cut out of sheet clusters of grapes and other fruit, and bunches of carrot hearts, hung temptingly enough to invite birds for a rare holiday treat.

So many original ideas were expressed in the variety of table arrangements, that the judges, Mrs. W. Thonson and Mrs. E. W. Meyer, Jr., must have had some difficulty in making their decision.

A formal dinner table, beautiful for its tranquil harmony of color scheme and decorations, was entered by Mrs. Sam Garber, president of the Birmingham unit, winner of the blue ribbon. A cloth of soft, dull brown silk covered the table, which was centered with a low bed of evergreens. Out of the greens rose the slender, upright stems of holly, each with a different length, shedding their soft glow on small white figurines of Christmas angels, which seemed to emanate the spirit of "peace on earth, good will toward men."

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The buffet table, always so popular with both hostesses and guests for holiday entertaining, was made the subject of another class of entries. The romance of Egypt with its oriental bargains, stately camels and the glamor of the Far East expressed in the arrangement of the buffet table entered by Mrs. Atwood B. Oatman, won the approval of the judges for first prize. A lovely wall hanging formed a fitting background for the tall brass candelsticks, quaint brass camels, the little call bell, and the lovely bowl centering the table filled with evergreens and berries.

Entirely different but equally original were the other winning tables in this group, for which Mrs. Theodore F. W. Meyer won second prize, Mrs. C. Theron Van Dusen, third, Mrs. Charles H. Welch, Jr., honorable mention.

Class For Centerpieces

In the class for centerpieces for holiday tables, Mrs. H. G. Wood was awarded the blue ribbon for her lovely and unique arrangement of greens, which interested guests to make a panel extending nearly the length of the table. Red tapers in brass candle holders, and other red and small brass bowls of cranberries. An old fashioned center of antique glass filled with bright gifts, and driven by a John St. Nick won the second place in this class.
