CHRISTMAS IS TIME FOR PARTIES

Recipes For Tasty Dishes To Aid Your Plans For Holiday Affairs

There could hardly be a better time for entertaining than this holiday season. The holidays are just a little hazy now, but you can entertain wistfully. Perhaps you have a college-boy or girl home for the first time, or perhaps you have a friend for the first time, or perhaps you have a friend who has just returned from a long trip and a merry merry Christmas to you all.

Waldorf Salad: Mix equal parts of chopped apples, oranges, pineapple, grapes, walnuts, macaroni, with cream dressing well seasoned.

Mistletoe Canape: On small rounds of toast spread anchovy paste. Place a few drops of anchovy on each, to serve as foliage for the "mistletoe." Place tiny pearmons along the stem to represent berries, and garnish with cream with dried egg yolks.

French Chocolate: 2 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup cold water, Dash of salt, 1/2 cup cream, whipped, 6 cups hot milk. Combine chocolate and water. Cook for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Beat with rotary egg beater until smooth, add sugar and salt. Return to fire and cook 4 minutes longer. Cool. Fold into cream. Place one rounded tablespoon into each cup and pour hot milk over it.

Manhattan Shrimp: 1 pint milk, 4 tablespoons fat, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup milk, Yolks of 2 eggs. Clean the shrimp and cook in half of the fat for 2 minutes. Add the seasoning and lemon juice and cook two minutes. Remove shrimp and make a white sauce of the remaining fat, flour and milk. When thickened add the yolks of the eggs, slightly heated, stirring in. Add the shrimp.

Pineapple Merringues: Allow one slice of canned pineapple for each serving. Place a puffed-pastry croquette in a stewed apricot in the center hole of each slice. Allow 1/2 cup sugar and 1 tablespoon cream for each slice of pineapple. Beat the sugar gradually and continue beat.

Fashion Tips: If you want to be really smart, be sure to get a pair of suede gloves, in pastel shade, with embroidered backs.
