Sound outlets will be placed at separated places throughout the auditorium at places convenient for worshippers. A sufficient number of receivers will be available to accommodate not only members of the congregation but other residents of Birmingham as well who might desire to avail themselves of this service. Five intensities of volume can be individually controlled, available to each user. Users will readily show any worshippers equipped with the apparatus.
