Chain Drug Stores Announce Increase For All Employees

A five per cent salary increase for all store employees in the 80 Cunningham's and Shaper's Drug Stores was announced this morning by Nate S. Shaper, president of Cunningham's Drug Stores. The increase will be effective January 1, 1937 for store managers, assistant managers, toilet goods girls, junior clerks, cigar clerks, candy and soda department employees, apprentices, delivery boys and porters who have been with the organization since July 1, 1936.

"With the increased 1937 bonuses for store managers announced two weeks ago, a grand total in excess of \$100,000 in bonuses and increased salaries will be distributed during the coming year," Mr. Shaper pointed out. "This increase has been made possible through the very successful fiscal year which has just closed."

Cunningham's Drug Stores are located in Detroit, Birmingham, and leading Michigan cities. The eighty-first store, at Shafter Road and Franklin, Detroit will be open early in January.

Annual Sale Of TB Seals Turn Upward

Reflecting better times throughout Michigan, receipts from the thirtieth annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals are turning upward this year, officials of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association and affiliated organizations in the state declared this week. Early returns on the Thanksgiving-to-Christmas sale clearly indicate, they believe, that the people of the state are ready and anxious to contribute again to the relief of human needs—a practice that many were forced to abandon during the depression years.

While returns during the early days of the sale were good, day-to-day receipts this week have been slightly less, it was pointed out. The necessity for maintaining the early pace if an increase over the 1935 mark is to be realized, was stressed by the anti-tuberculosis forces.

At Lansing, Theodore J. Werle, executive secretary of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, stated it would be necessary to send a follow-up message to the several thousand in the state who have not yet contributed, a procedure involving considerable added expense.
