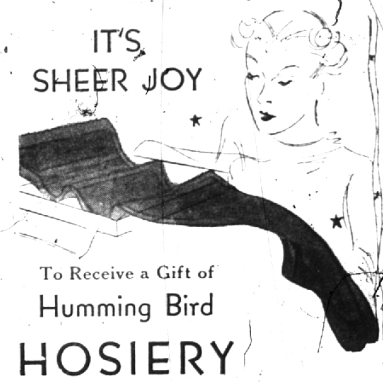
The Fellowship Club will give a musical program Friday at the American Legion Home. Roy F. Smith is in charge of arrangements.
