**FIVE YEARS AGO**  
Charles J. Shea, prominent local druggist and former village president, was re-elected chairman of the Property Owners' Division of the Birmingham Local Estate Board at the annual organization meeting held in the Community House last night.  
A reduction of about \$9,000 per year in the village payroll and the release of two embezzlers was approved by the Village Commission Monday night, on the recommendation of Village Manager James W. Parry.  
The Bloomfield Hills Commission Tuesday night refused to adopt an ordinance making it compulsory for all milk distributors in the village to pasteurize their product, but instead compromised with the village health officer, Dr. Harold B. Rowley, by passing an ordinance making Grade A, certified and pasteurized milk all eligible for distribution in the village.  
A new zoning ordinance for Bloomfield Hills Village, which permits the erection of multiple dwellings in the village for the first time, was adopted by the Bloomfield Hills Commission Tuesday night.  
At a meeting of the executive committee of the Birmingham Unemployment Relief Committee held Wednesday night of last week, Lloyd R. Reil, assistant township supervisor, was made director of welfare for the work to be handled here this winter.
