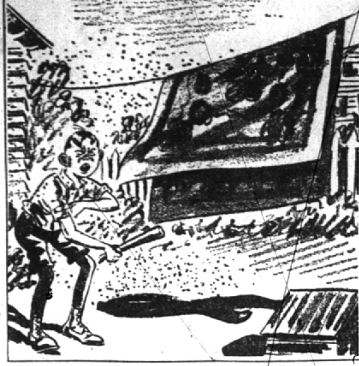
## DEFENSE WEEK NOW OBSERVED

Col. W. B. Rosevear, Jr. is Local Speaker on Patriotic Plan

National Defense Week will be observed February 12th to 22nd, the birth dates of Presidents Lincoln and Washington. The occasion was originated and is sponsored by the Reserve Officers Association of the United States, together with the National Guard Association, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Spanish War Veterans, Disabled American Veterans and other patriotic and public-spirited organizations.

The Birmingham Chapter, Reserve Officers Association, Kline A. Sprague, President, is sponsoring the observance locally. Colonel William B. Rosevear, Jr., National Vice-President, Reserve Officers Association, spoke Wednesday noon before the Lions Club of Birmingham and left Wednesday evening for Central Air Lines for Washington to attend the annual National Central Meeting of the Association, February 12th to 15th.

Colonel Rosevear, in his talk, urged that Congress fulfill the provisions of the National Defense Act, which was enacted by Congress in 1920 after careful study of our National Defense needs. He emphasized that the Act is truly American in its inception and execution, as it provides for a small standing army and places main reliance upon civilian reserves. The grand total of regulars and reserves in the army, as urged by the Reserve Officers Association is only 1,200th of Kaiser's total. 1,15th of France, and 1 1/2th of Italy of Japan.

I hope that they spend it in swimming, playing baseball and hunting for a radio set. Following all the delightful pursuits that I would have followed in the springs of my youth—if it hadn't been for housecleaning. And I also wonder if the kids whose play is supervised, and who play all manner of swings and trapezes and hurdles with which to amuse themselves out of school can really enjoy themselves as much as I would have enjoyed myself, if I never had to take spring mattresses apart and put them together again.

## The Way of Inflation

If a merchant, or a farmer, or the average householder persistently spends more than he earns, he goes broke. He pays for his folly in the wreck of his business, his property, and, perhaps, his career.

With government it can be different. From time to time various nations have indulged in continued reckless expenditures, yet escaped immediate collapse. How? By resort to the desperate remedy of inflation—whether of currency or of credit.

The difference is that the individual bears the brunt of the blow himself, while governments pass it on to their citizens.

History has demonstrated this on many occasions. Perhaps the best remembered example of recent years is that of Germany. There, post-war inflation brought hardship and hunger to millions of workers. Recruits of the average run of politicians who brought it all about, or the very rich, went hungry. That as reserved for the average run of citizens, who saw prices rise so swiftly that neither earnings nor savings could keep pace with them.

For a while the situation grew so serious that workmen found it necessary to bargain for their services at the end of each day's labor. They knew that if they waited, prices might mount so rapidly that even a week's pay could buy one bowl of soup.

Germany's experience was not an isolated one. It has been duplicated to a lesser degree in many countries since in many periods of history. It is because of the evidence such experiments offer that an increasing number of thoughtful Americans oppose the course of reckless government expenditure that causes inflation.

And those are the people who can stop its hurts.

They face a great responsibility. Under our Constitution the conduct of national affairs rests ultimately in their hands. If they insist on reasonable economy, the men who represent them in government must obey the mandate. If they remain indifferent, they encourage either the burden of increased taxes, or the still heavier toll of inflation with all its hidden opportunities for the speculator, and its grim penalties for the worker.
