WHO ARE YOU? The Romance of Your Name

An Allen? Through many changes in spelling, but the present well-known form has been in general use since the thirteenth century.

The name was first found in a very early period, even before the Christian era, spelled Ala, from the Arvan word "al", meaning mountains.

Later, this name is found in Britain, then it was transferred to Brittany, and finally brought back to Britain by Alan-f, a general in the army of William the Conqueror, who, after the historic battle of Hastings in 1066, was created Earl of Richmond. At his death this title passed to his brother, Alan II, and from him was handed down for many generations.

One of the first members of the family to use the name, as it is now spelled, was Henry Allen, Lord of Hucksford, Staffordshire, England, in 1272. William Henry Allen, high sheriff of County Devon, 1851, traced his descent in a direct line to Henry. Most of the branches spelling the name, Allen, Allyn, Aljean and Aljean can trace to Henry.

John Allyn, a canon of Windsor, was born 1272. William Allen, born 1522, was made a cardinal in 1581. Henry Allen was bailiff of York, 1271. Johannes Allen was a member of parliament from York, 1317.

In London, 1246, Piers Allyn was Lord Mayor of that city. There were many of this name with titles of high degree, duked and lorded, who are found in every period of England's history.

There were many "first settlers" of this family in America. Too many to recount here, but one of the earliest arrivals was Edward, who left London in 1620. His vessel was attacked off Portsmouth, N. H., by pirates, a common occurrence that day, but he effected his escape and made his way to Nantucket, R. I., where he settled. He served his community as juror, constable and trustee.

The great number of the Allen pilgrims who settled in New England in the earliest days of the colony is sufficient evidence to warrant the vast number of descendants in every part of the United States today. There were Allens who were of the Virginia colony also.
