Handling Big Hands
Most of the average players at Contract know how to finesse, draw trump, discard losers on set-up suits and make games on declarations that require only straight away play. But the swing in scoring comes when hands that will make game only with good play arise, or when "rock crusher" holdings are dealt.

Play of the Hand
East opens the Heart Jack, hoping to find his partner blank in that suit. Dummy wins and a Club is returned. North is passing and leading Spades, finessing the Queen. West refuses to win and South returns to the Ace. The Heart King is played. West trumping with his King of Spades. North discarding a Diamond. West leads a low Diamond, taken by North's Ace. Now a small Club is ruffed in dummy. The Heart Queen played for another Diamond discard, and a low Heart trumped by Declarer. Dummy's last Spade takes care of North's remaining Club and the slam contract is fulfilled.
