Summer Menus For Outdoor Dinners

During these hot days it is a relief to have a meal that requires the minimum of preparation on the part of the housekeeper.

Chili Con Carne
Peel and slice five medium sized onions and 1 seeded green pepper. Saute this mixture slowly until soft in 3 tablespoons fat in your covered kettle. While this cooking is going on, cut 2 pounds of rump steak in 1/2 inch cubes. Include a few cubes of suet. When the onions are soft, add this meat and cook uncovered, until the meat starts to sizzle and brown. It will take several minutes to bring the meat to the frying point. Have ready 1 1/2 cups of boiling water to which has been added 1 cup of tomato juice or puree; also have 3 tablespoons of chili powder mixed smooth in 1/2 cup of cold water. Pour the tomato liquid and chili paste in the kettle when the meat starts frying. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce of garlic, minced fine. Cook slowly for about 1 1/2 hours, or until the meat is tender. Add 1/2 cup hot water if the mixture thickens before the meat is done. Finally add the contents of a can of baked kidney beans. When thoroughly heated, taste and season with more salt and chili powder if needed. Serve with buttered rolls and coffee. This may be made at home and heated when ready to serve.

Brigand Chop Suet
2 onions chopped fine
2 green peppers chopped fine
1/2 cup drippings
1 small onion minced
1 lb. chopped beef
1 No. 2 can of spaghetti in tomato sauce
1 cup hot water
Cook onions and peppers in 1/2 cup of drippings, add mushrooms and chopped beef. Cook a few minutes, then add spaghetti and hot water. Cover and cook 45 minutes. Serve with rolls.

Potato and Frankfurter Salad
6 frankfurters
French dressing
6 medium sized cold cooked potatoes, diced
1 small onion peeled and minced
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1/2 cup diced celery
6 medium sized tomatoes

Prick the frankfurters well and cook in boiling water to cover, until tender. Drain and skin and cut in thirds, crosswise. Chill and add 1/2 cup French dressing; let stand 1/2 hour. Combine the potatoes, minced onion, parsley and cut in thirds, crosswise. Chill and add 1/2 cup French dressing. Let stand 1/2 hour. Combine the potatoes, minced onion, parsley and celery. Add onion and well seasoned French dressing, about 1/2 cup. Chill. When ready to serve heat in a mound in the center of a platter. Arrange the frankfurters around the salad, then group thin slices of tomato, which have been sprinkled with salt and pepper, at the end of the platter.

Chicken Stew
Cut a chicken of about 3 pounds weight in pieces and stew until tender. Remove the meat from the bones, cutting this meat up in pieces of uniform size. Saute 2 sliced onions and 1 seeded green pepper in 3 tablespoons of fat. When they are soft add a medium sized can of tomatoes and 3 cloves of garlic, minced fine. Season to taste with salt, sugar, a pinch of powdered cloves and a bay leaf. Simmer for 1/2 hour, then remove bay leaf and add an 8-oz. can of mushrooms, liquid and all of a No. 2 can of corn. Whole kernels are better than crushed corn. Next put in your pieces of chicken. Heat thoroughly, and make seasoning if necessary and stir all ingredients together. This dish reheats perfectly.

Spice Cake
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
3 cups cake flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon allspice
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons shaved citron
1/2 cup fruit juice
1 cup milk
3 squares chocolate, melted
Cream shortening, add sugar gradually and cream well. Add beaten egg yolks. Sift flour once before measuring, then sift flour, baking powder, salt and spices together. Add citron to flour and add alternately to the creamed mixture with fruit juice and milk. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a loaf pan lined with greased paper. Bake 45 to 60 minutes in an oven 350 degrees.

For lemon frosting, cream 2 tablespoons of butter and 1 egg yolk. Beat egg whites and 2 tablespoons of powdered sugar, beat until stiff. Combine mixture of juice of 1/2 lemon and grated rind of 1 lemon. Stir in 3/4 cups powdered sugar. Mix well spread on cake.

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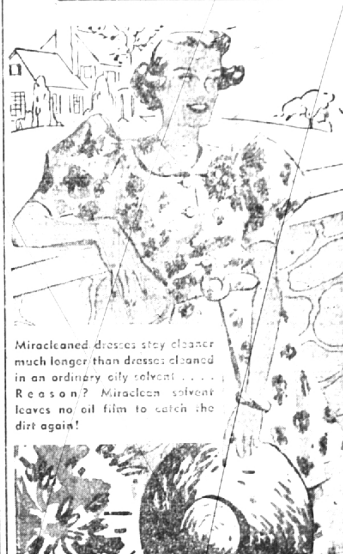
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
