Serve Iced Drinks These Warm Days

If any of you are as hot as I am this minute, you'll welcome a cool drink. Cold drinks, such as iced tea, any iced fruit juices and iced chocolate are most refreshing and beneficial. The modern housekeeper should have on hand the ingredients to make a cooling drink at a minute's notice. Be sure that the chilled drink is appealing to the eye as well as to the palate. Try some of these drinks on your thirsty friends.

Fruited Tea
2 tablespoons black tea.
1 large can sliced pineapple.
3 lemons.
2 cups sugar.
Steep the tea in 2 cups boiling water. Strain, add the sugar, mix well and cool. Add lemon juice and orange juice to the tea. Boil the lemon and orange rinds for 15 minutes in enough water to cover them. Strain, cool and add to the tea. Add the pineapple juice. Strain all through a double cheesecloth, until clear. Cut the sliced pineapple in small pieces and add to the tea. Serve thoroughly. Add cherry ice cubes when ready to serve.

Spiced Lemonade
2 cups sugar.
1 cup lemon juice.
1 1/2 cup orange juice.
1 1/4 teaspoon cloves.
2 cups sugar.
Mix the water, cloves and sugar. Put over the fire, bring to boiling point slowly and boil 2 minutes. Cool. Add fruit juices and enough cold water to give desired strength. Serve in tall glasses with cracked ice. Garnish with a whole strawberry.

Iced Mint Cocoa
Cook together for 5 minutes, 1 cup sugar, 6 tablespoons of cocoa and 1 cup of boiling water. Add a sprig of fresh mint, crushed, and 5 cups of scalding water. Cook over hot water for a few minutes, then strain, chill, add 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla and serve over crushed ice. Top each glass with a spoonful of whipped cream and a mint leaf.

Ginger Ale Fizz
1 cup sugar.
1 cup water.
1 cup grape juice.
4 tablespoons lime juice.
Ginger ale—ice cubes.
Boil for 2 minutes the sugar and water. Chill, combine with grape juice and lime juice and dilute the mixture with 6 glasses of water. Put 2 ice cubes in each glass and just before serving fill in with chilled ginger ale.

Blackberry Nectar
Combine 2 cups blackberry juice drained from canned blackberries, 1 cup lemon juice and a few grains of salt. Add 1 pint bottle of carbonated water. Garnish with three slices of banana and a few blackberries. Serve at once.

Ginger Julep
Chop 1 cup preserved ginger, add 1 quart of water and 1 cup sugar. Boil 10 minutes. Add 1 cup orange juice, and 1/2 cup lemon juice. Cool. Serve with cracked ice.

Prune Grape Punch
1 cup cooked crushed prunes.
1 cup water.
1 cup sugar.
3 cups cold green tea.
1/2 cup lemon juice.
Combine prunes, water and sugar. Boil to dissolve sugar. Strain. Chill. Add tea, lemon juice and grape juice. Mix thoroughly. Chill.

Mint Delight
Mix together 4 cups cold water, 1/2 teaspoon green coloring and 1/2 teaspoon peppermint flavoring. Pour into a freezing tray, put the metal divider in the tray for making ice cubes. Freeze. Combine 2 cups lemon juice, 1 cup of sugar and 1/2 cup cold water. Stir until the sugar dissolves. Pour into a freezing tray. Freeze to a mush like consistency. Mash with a spoon and mix 2 cups water in a pitcher. Partly fill each glass with the lemonade mixture, add a green ice mint cube and decorate with a sprig of mint.

NAT'L FURNITURE SHOW NOW OPEN

Exhibition Presents Modern And 18th Century Popular Styles

Modern and 18th Century furniture patterns—contemporary and traditional designs—are staging a spirited race for the title of the furniture industry's most popular style, according to advance word received by the Sears store in Pontiac from the American Furniture Mart, Chicago, where the national furniture show opened on July 6. Whether modern will continue its sensational rise or whether there'll be a reaction toward the time-tested 18th Century mode will be decided during the two weeks of the show, when buyers will select the merchandise they will feature during the coming season. "The Air Raid"

H E R T E'S a yarn that sounds incredible. I might not have believed it when I first saw it if the same thing on a small scale hadn't happened to a friend of mine once.

Distinguished Adventurer Dorris Schofield of Watertown is going to tell us about what happened to her in 1930 on a deserted stretch of sand near Chatham Beach, off Cape Cod.

It was early in June, and Dorris had gone over to the Cape with her nine-month-old baby to help open up a hotel her aunt operated in West Harwich. One day, while they were getting the hotel in order, a party of friends came over for the weekend, and they knocked off work to go up to the beach and dig clams. It was hard going along the beach and Dorris had to carry the baby. She was tired and so was her aunt. About a mile from the spot where the clams were they quit the party cold and sat down, intending to wait there until the rest came back.

Flock of Screaming Sea Gulls Circle Around Dorris
They sat there for about ten minutes, and Dorris remarked that she felt "like you would catch up with the rest of the crowd?" her aunt asked, "If you do, I'll sit here and mind the baby."

The sound good to Dorris, and she heard her aunt and the baby behind, she started up the beach. It was a deserted strip of sand. No bathers ever came up that far. The rest of the crowd were out of sight around a bend. She walked on for about a quarter of a mile, when suddenly she heard strange sounds coming from seaward and looking up, saw a flock of birds moving in toward shore. As they came closer she saw that they were gulls. "They were screaming," she said, "and making a terrible sound with their wings, but I didn't pay much attention to them. I walked on, waiting for them to pass over, but suddenly I noticed that they were circling low and right over my head."

Vicious Intruders Give Good Imitation of Vultures.

There were perhaps twenty birds in the original flock, but their cries attracted others. Soon there were a hundred or more of them circling and wheeling over Dorris. She began to get alarmed. Suddenly, one of the birds—straight at her head. It came within a foot of her, then shot by in the air again. Another followed—and another. Then they began swooping by two and three.

I know how Dorris must have felt at that moment. That pal of mine whom I mentioned a while back was attacked by one lone small-sized gull as he was walking along a beach, and although he suspected that bird by close to two hundred pounds, he told me he was scared stiff for a moment while that bird was maneuvering to get at his eyes.

At the same time he says he felt a smothering admiration for that little bird's courage, too. A vulture ten times his size would never get near a man unless he was pretty sure he was dead or dying. An eagle would tackle a healthy man unless the man gets too close to its nest, but here was a little bird, weighing less than a few active five minutes with his darting and wheeling and charging.

Providence Intervenes to Thwart the Tormentors.

There was only one gull after that, but he kept him busy. Dorris had a hundred or more coming at her and she was scared to death. "Acting as a frightened imposter," she says, "I ran for the water, swinging my arms wildly about my head to beat them off. I didn't dare to look up or they'd have gotten my eyes, and I realize now that if I'd ever gone into the water as I intended they would have had me at their mercy. "Providence must have been taking care of me, for at the edge of the sand were two large horseshoe crabs, and they frightened me almost as much as the gulls. "I turned and ran back, and by another act of providence I stumbled and fell right on top of a three-foot piece of board."

Nothing ever looked so good to Dorris as that chunk of rotted plank. She picked it up and began swinging it over her head. But still the gulls followed, screaming, beating their wings, darting at her. She hit it, a couple of times, but not one fell to the ground.

Dorris Leads the Harpies Away From Her Baby.

Unconsciously she had started running back in the direction from which she had come, but suddenly she realized that would never do. She was still drawing those vicious birds close to her and her baby.

She turned around and began running in the other direction. The crowd digging clams were three-quarters of a mile away. If she could only run that far!

"As I ran," she says, "I had to keep swinging the board. My legs moved mechanically. Almost dead with fright I stumbled on, conscious of nothing but the fact that the stick must be kept swinging—that I must keep on running."

Clam Diggers Succeed in Frightening Gulls Away.

Dorris had a full quart of a clam—and still the birds followed. She was panting—exhausted—paralyzed with fear, but still she struggled to keep her feet under her. She ran another quarter of a mile, and by that time she was almost ready to drop. She rounded a bend, came in sight of the crowd digging clams, and then she did drop—collapsed on the sand and fainted.

Dorris had on a red bathing suit, and the rest of the crowd recognized it. They came running out of the water waving pails and shovels and only then did the gulls wheel and fly out over the water.

When she came to the birds were gone, but blood was oozing from a gash in her leg. Dorris doesn't know how she got it—didn't even feel it at the time it was called to her attention. But before she got back that leg was so swollen that they had to carry her. Dorris doesn't know why those gulls attacked her. She thinks they might have mistaken her red bathing suit for blood. But that doesn't explain the gull that tackled that pal of mine. I asked him about it, and his bathing suit was blue.
