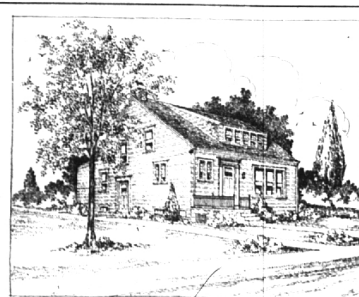

THREE PER CENT DIVIDEND VOTED

Directors Of Federal Savings And Loan Association Announce Payment

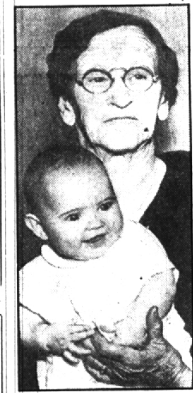
A dividend of 3 per cent on all classes of shares for the year July 1, 1935 to July 1, 1936 was voted by the Board of Directors of the Birmingham Federal Savings & Loan Association at a meeting held in the association's office, 241 East Maple Avenue recently.

In addition to the declaration of the dividend, which will distribute approximately \$1280 to 61 sav- ing members of the Association, a substantial sum was added to the surplus and reserve account from the earnings of the year. Hazel E. Lawler, Secretary of the Association, said yesterday.

During the last six months the Association made progress in every phase of its activity. There was a substantial growth in the financial statement as of July 1 showing an increase of \$119,000 in assets over the corresponding period a year ago. The mortgage loan department of the Association reported the granting of 27 loans on homes during the past year, totaling \$87,867.18.

The Birmingham Federal Savings & Loan Association also offers Protection of Individual Savings against loss up to \$5000.00 by the Federal Savings & Loan Corporation, an instrumentality of the United States Government, which was provided by an act of Congress in June, 1934. Fifty Breeds Of Dogs To Be Exhibited At Show

September fifth was set as the date for the first dog show of the Oakland County Kennel Club at a meeting of the club officials Tuesday night, in the office of Chief of Police John P. Hackett. The show will be a licensed dog exhibition for all breeds and is to be conducted under the auspices of the American Kennel Club. It will be held on the Birmingham Athletic field at Pierce School, it was announced.

The show will be open to approximately 50 breeds of dogs, and the club expects more than 700 entries from all over the United States and Canada. Because it is a "licensed" show, the dogs who are entered must be typical of a breed, and registration or pedigree are not necessary for the entrance. The entrance fee will be \$1.00 per entrant. Judges are Alfred Delmont of Winnwood, Pennsylvania, and Louis Warden of New York City. Several other special judges will also be chosen. Trophies, cash prizes, and the usual ribbons will be awarded to winning dogs.

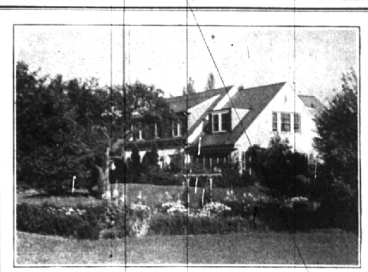
