ELWOOD HURLS ONE HIT GAME

Local Legion Team Wins Second Victory Over Rochester 9

"Lefty" Elwood cocked back that good port wing of his and fired away for nine innings at the enervated Sunday afternoon at Springdale Park and when the smoke of battle had cleared away the local American Legion baseball team had smothered the Rochester legion contingent 13 to 0. Only one visitor was able to solve Elwood's hook-arm slants, Aldrich, left fielder, getting a scratch single, while 13 opponents bit the dust via the strike-out route.

It was the second defeat administered to Rochester by the Birmingham team this year. The locals combined eight hits with seven errors and numerous bases on balls to push over a lopsided score. The only extra base hit of the game was registered by Duke Potere, who slammed out a two-bagger in the seventh inning, his second hit of the game.

Running rampant on the sacks, the locals swiped 18 bases, Potere and Thompson receiving credit for six each. The Birmingham outfielders might as well have not played as there was not a single ball hit past the infield by Rochester, another tribute to the splendid hurling of Elwood.

The local legion team has now won three of its four games played, the only defeat having been suffered at the hands of Royal Oak, at present undefeated. A chance to avenge that one loss will be offered to the home team next Saturday when they journey to Royal Oak for a return engagement.

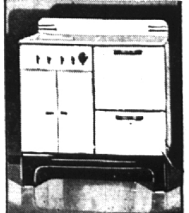
