Poetic Fantasy Ends Year For St. Dunstan's Guild

The audience at the Greek Theater at Cranbrook, Friday evening was transported into a world of fantasy with Pierrot and Columbine, when St. Dunstan's Guild presented Edna St. Vincent Millay's symbolic play, "Aria Da Capo," as its closing performance of the year.

The play, in the whimsical manner of the poet, reveals life as a stage on which frolics, represented by Pierrot and Columbine, and tragedy, represented by the Masque and shepherds, play their little dramas side by side.

Pierrot, with scant understanding of reality, is concerned about the gay, inconsequential things of life, which he imagines to be matters of importance. On the same stage, two shepherds, dominated by the Masque of Tragedy, begin as simple friends, and through suspicion, greed and hate, become enemies, are led to the murder one another. After which, Pierrot and Columbine, with the callousness of the indifferent, and of the real world, live their own lives regardless of the tragedy at their door.

The illusion of a world of fantasy created by the play was further carried out by the setting. The classic lines of the Greek Theater, with the pool in the background, seemed as if conjured out of the night to serve the purpose. In addition to the play, two groups of songs were offered by
