STORY OF BEET SUGAR IS TOLD TO THE BUREAU

J. A. Brock, Authority On Industry, Speaks To Exchange Group

J. Arthur Brock, educational secretary of the Farmers and Manufacturers Beet Sugar Association, and recognized as one of the foremost authorities on beet sugar, addressed the local Exchange Club at their regular Tuesday noon luncheon in the Community House, taking up the subject and presenting a wealth of the business in addition to giving many interesting facts concerning this state's position in the beet sugar industry. ... Mr. Brock, touching on the use of sugar in general, asserted that it is the most complete fuel food known to man, having no waste and being 100 per cent digestible. The two best kinds of sugar, refined product are beets and cane, he said, but producing an equal amount of sugar from less sugar. Mr. Brock said, has played a prominent role in world history, causing revolutions, changing boundaries and forcing powerful rulers to abdicate. ... The building and the roof fell in during the time of Christ, the speaker said. In 617 A. D. monks along the Rhine River learned to produce granulated sugar but for centuries after that the price for the sugar was only from \$200 to \$400 per pound, he pointed out. It was not until the time of Queen Elizabeth that sugar was considered necessary at a reasonable price. Most of the raw cane sugar consumed in the United States comes from Cuba where laborers work for twenty cents per ten hour day, the speaker said. Despite import duty, the building and the roof fell in. The price of the sugar has not kept up with that imported from the island, even though ideal conditions for growing sugar in Michigan. Michigan is the third largest producer of beet sugar in this country, according to the speaker. ...
