Judges Are Made Known For Annual Flower Show

Mrs. W. D. Thompson of Blountfield Hills, and Mrs. Frederick Campbell and Mrs. W. Beresford Palmer of Grosse Pointe will be judges for the annual flower show sponsored by the Birmingham unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association to be held at the Community House Wednesday from 2:30 to 7 p. m.

Judging of the exhibits will take place before the show opens, after the opening the judges will discuss the exhibits pointing out the reasons for making awards. The lower floor of the House will be given over to the arrangement of flowers and plants in the various classes. The Ruth Shain room will be devoted to the arrangement of occasional tables. Other tables will be for terraces or picnical occasions or breakfast or informal luncheon—will be placed in the men's lounge and in the main auditorium will be specimen blooms, miniature arrangements and the shadow boxes will be placed upon the stage.

So far, five members have made entries for shadow boxes in the various classes. Mrs. Jules Agrimonte will arrange a yellow box. Mrs. Sam Garber, lavender; Mrs. Alvin Galt, green; Mrs. E. Caldwell, blue, and Mrs. F. H. McKinney, white. Mrs. Galt's non-members are invited to exhibit, include specimen blooms of such flowers as geraniums, columbine, poppies, roses, iris or any other seasonal flower, which must have been given by the exhibitor, and table arrangements. Specimen blooms may be exhibited as single blooms or in a group of three of a kind. The other open class includes table arrangement for terrace or dining room, or for breakfast or informal luncheon. There are also six open classes for child exhibits.

Rolls Popular Among Breads

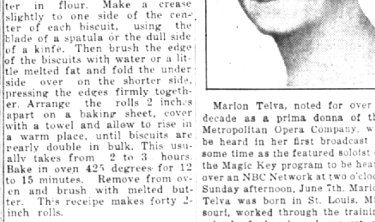
To some housekeepers the baking of rolls is beyond their kitchen program; yet rolls are one of the most popular breads. They are acceptable at breakfast, dinner or supper. Make up a batch of dough, cover it tightly and store it in the refrigerator—sometimes for as long as a week. Then it is only a matter of minutes before it is shaped and set to rise.

Cheese Rolls 1 cup hot water 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 teaspoon salt 1 compressed yeast cake 1/4 cup lukewarm water 1 teaspoon granulated sugar 1 egg well beaten 1 1/2 cups grated cheese 3 1/2 to 4 cups flour Combine the hot water with 1-4 cup granulated sugar. Cool until lukewarm. Meanwhile soften the yeast cake in the lukewarm water, add 1 teaspoon of sugar, then stir into the first mixture. Next add the well beaten egg, salt and cheese and mix much flour as can be stirred into the dough without kneading—about 1 1/2 to 4 cups. Toss dough on a lightly floured board. Knead until easily handled. Then form pieces of dough into balls 1 1/2 inch in diameter by folding the edges of each ball under until the top is smooth. Place 3 balls in each section of a greased muffin pan, cover and let rise in a warm place until nearly double its bulk. Bake in an oven of 425 degrees from 12 to 15 minutes. Remove from oven and brush with melted fat. This makes two dozen cloverleaf rolls or one large loaf of bread. If preferred, this dough may be brushed with melted fat and stored in the refrigerator.
