**Poster And Essay
Contest For Pupils**
High-school teachers of this city
have just received an announce-
ment of two national competitive
events—a poster contest and an
essay contest—open to high-
school students of Michigan.
Scholarships and cash prizes will
be awarded the winners.
Both contests are sponsored by
the live-stock and meat industry
of the United States, through the
National Live Stock and Meat
Board. The poster contest is be-
ing held for the first time, while
the essay contest has been an
annual event for the past thirteen
years. Last year's state title hold-
er in the essay contest was Miss
Julia Walenski of Pontiac.
In both the poster and the es-
say contests, entries are to be on
phases of the subject of meat as
a food. Prominent artists and
home economists will make up the
committee of judges, according to
the announcement. The contests
close on April 15.

**POOR STREET LIGHTING
BOOSTS TRAFFIC DEATHS**
The death risk on a poorly light-
ed street at night is eight times
the day time risk, but adequate
lighting may cut this hazard ratio
to only two to one, even on
heavy traffic streets.
Detroit discovered this relation-
ship between lighted streets and
traffic safety after reducing its
street lighting in 1932 as an econ-
omy measure. L. J. Schrenk, su-
perintendent of the Detroit light-
ing commission, told the twenty-
second annual Michigan Highway
conference, meeting here at the
University of Michigan. In 1932
Detroit cut its street lighting to
65 per cent of the 1931 strength
and found the death rate at night
increasing from 124 to 151 per
year. Raising the strength to 80
per cent of the 1931 amount re-
duced the rate to 138 and the 100
per cent power was soon restored,
Schrenk stated.
