 Series Of Four Topics On Education, Schools Is Announced

These addresses will be en-

tirely non-technical and of general interest to the parents of school-age children, to taxpayers, and to those directly connected with school work.

Rankin will open the series with the subject—"Curriculum Construction: What we teach How and Why it is selected." This will be an answer, presented from the average citizen's point of view, by a nationally known leader in educational planning, to those many questions which are asked by everyone interested in young folks. The Forum discussion gives everyone an opportunity to have their own questions answered by a speaker qualified to do so.
 Dr. Rankin is Supervising Director of Curriculum and Research

Detroit Public Schools. He has an intimate contact with the student point of view through his courses at Wayne University where he is Professor of Education. His broad relationships with the needs of all classes of people are indicated by the fact that he is now President of the Social Workers Club of Detroit.

TACHOMETER DIAL SHOWS CHRYSLER ECONOMY
 Chrysler cars, when equipped with the Chrysler automatic overdrive, have installed on their instrument panel a tachometer dial that is a constant reminder of the great saving in gasoline, oil and engine wear made possible by the overdrive. This dial is so designed that one indicator point simultaneously shows three sets of figures. The outer arrow on this indicator shows the speed in miles per hour. The second arrow shows the number of revolutions that the engine is making in conventional drive. The inner arrow shows the number of revolutions that the engine is making with overdrive engaged.
