D. A. R. GIVEN FLAG AS BIRTHDAY GIFT

Mrs. Heatley Green Donor of Emblem Marking Chapter's First Anniversary

A birthday gift has arrived for Piety Hill Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, which recently observed its first anniversary. It is a silk platform flag presented by Mrs. Heatley Green of West Maple road, former regent of the Louisiana St. Clair Chapter in Detroit.

The flag will be displayed for the first time Tuesday, when Mrs. Delbert C. James and Mrs. Mark B. Harris will entertain members of the local chapter at the Community House at 2:30 p. m. For the first time, the flag will be viewed by the members in its traditional place beside the regent, Mrs. William L. Graham.

Through the novel device of a small flag used as a birthday card, Mrs. Green informed the chapter at its anniversary meeting Feb. 12 that the large flag was to follow as a gift to mark the chapter's first successful year.

At the business meeting preceding the program, officers and directors will be nominated from the floor. Election of the candidates nominated will be held at the May meeting of the chapter. After the business session, Mrs. P. Cole will give some interesting highlights on "The Early History of Michigan."

At the tea, which will follow the program Mrs. Green and Mrs. Walter G. Stecker will preside.

Lost Isle Motif For Art Academy Dance

"The Lost Island of Atlantis," believed by the ancients to have been submerged by an earthquake, will be restored to the eyes of 400 guests invited to Crandall's costume ball, to be given by the students of the Cranbrook Academy of Art, Friday evening, March 20, at the Academy.

Vincent Henderson is general chairman of the affair. Edwin Bacon designed the decorations, using as a motif the imaginary charm of the lost Atlantis. Mr. Bacon's design for the decorations was accepted by a committee of judges including Eiel Saarinen, Zoltan Sepeshy, Carl Miles, Richard P. Rasmussen, and Marshall Friedricks. George Tamblin is chairman of the committee on arrangements, and Mr. Henderson is in charge of invitations.

The general scheme of the decorations will be to provide a simple background against which the brilliance of the costumes will stand out in colorful relief. As for costume designs, the guests may rely upon their individual taste, originality and resourcefulness to produce any and unique effects according to Mr. Henderson.

Hobby Show Brings Out Old Relics and New Crafts

Treasures of long ago, quaint pieces of China, unusual collections and interesting handicrafts are being discovered each day by committee in charge of the Hobby Show to be given March 25 to 27th inclusive under auspices of the League of St. James' Women in the church school building.

Entries for the show will be divided into three main classes, collections, handicrafts and old China. Objects old or new may be entered as exhibits, and the boy who prides himself on the making of model airplanes is as welcome as the collector of antiques. Mrs. George T. Hendrie is general chairman, and Mrs. L. M. Baker is chairman of entries.

A relic of the past, which played a prominent part in national history, will be loaned for the show by James Verway, Jr., of Lasher road. It is a colorful Paisley dressing gown worn by Jefferson Davis, who was disguised as a woman at the time of his capture. Mr. Verway's father, the late James Verway was a member of the Fourth Michigan Cavalry during the Civil War, and was one of those who succeeded in capturing the famous Confederate General, Davis. The coloring of the gown has not been dimmed by the passing of many years, and the background is still of a brilliant cerise, and the Paisley design is still brilliant in turquoise blue and red.

Costumes of many lands may be seen complete in miniature in the large and unusual collection of dolls to be entered by Mrs. Waldo R. Fellows of Riverton road. The dolls, which vary from three to six inches in size, represent a wide number of nationalities in their dress, including Russian, Swedish, Dutch, Irish, Scotch, Tyrolean, Swedish, Norwegian and American Indian costumes. There are about 45 in the collection, which began with the doll in the Russian costume.

A hobby, which has gone to the post for expression, is that of old poetry, collected by Mr. and Mrs. Lane Bishop of Poppleton, Michigan. Some interesting pieces in the collection are two sets of old French menus purchased in Paris by Mr. Bishop, porringers and a set of old English soup spoons or ladles, purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Bishop from the Thieves Market in London. The collection includes about 20 pieces, all of which came from some interesting nook or corner of Europe.

Mrs. Hendrie will enter a collection of boxes of various types, including an old English pomade box, one of Dutch silver, one from Japan, and others from distant parts of the world. In the class for dolls, Mrs. Hendrie will enter the quaint syring jug, which has been treasured in her family since the days of her great-grandmother.

One of Dr. George T. Raynal's hobbies is the making of ship models. Among these is a model of "Virginia II," the yacht owned by Gordon Lefebvre. This model will be seen in the Hobby Show. It is about 40 inches long and complete in every detail.

"We hope through the hobby show to unearth many fine old things, which have been stored away, half-forgotten for years," Mrs. Hendrie said, "we are sure there are many such in the community of this type. We are also equally interested in having the young people come forward with their modern hobbies of puppetry and the making of airplane models. The show is open to all, and we cordially invite those with hobbies to take part, as variety is one of our aims."
