Robinson was in charge of the reserve players.

Burt Diemer scored two baskets for the Maples to start the game. Clutter scored the opener for the Grey and Blue. Husband tied the score at four apiece and Thomson and Muccino each scored to raise the deadlock to six. Muccino got another basket and a foul. Diemer dropped in three more baskets for the Parkers, and Adams got one for the Parkers. The score at the

half was 12-11, the Birmingham five leading.

Diemer got his sixth basket to start the second half. Wallace made good on two fouls. Zinnbauer got Birmingham's last basket. Turner scored a basket. Wallace got one. Adams, Larch, Wikop, and McAdam sank successive baskets, and Knapp netted a foul to end the game. The final score was 26-16.

High scorer for the game was Diemer, who counted 12 points. Every Hazel Park player scored. The Hazel Park team committed only three fouls, one of them a technical foul. Birmingham committed 16. Birmingham failed to score on any of their tries and Hazel Park got only four of their tries.

## Birmingham before today

The two houses on the east side of Woodward and north of Middle Street (Hamilton Ave.) were owned by Mr. Edgar Poppleton and Mrs. Rachel Willetts, respectively. They have been described in former articles. Mrs. L. T. Furman and daughter, Ona, made their home in the living quarters belonging to the millinery store which was in a section of the frame building opposite old National Hotel Woodward Ave. The millinery shop was operated by Mrs. Furman.

Mrs. Salter The home of Miss Cromwell and her mother was at the S. W. corner of Willetts and Woodward. Mrs. Cromwell was a very sweet old lady and she and her daughter were Presbyterians. Miss Cromwell was very stately and possessed a wonderful personality used to call at her home with Stella Ward and as a child I was very much impressed with her graciousness. She was one of the first members of the Ladies' Church Society of the Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Cromwell was the grandmother of the late Mrs. Win Fred Johnson Blair and of Harry Johnson.

The Cromwell home was purchased by Mr. William Castle and moved to present site, just west of the parking lot, on the south side of Willetts St. This was the Castle home for several years.

Mrs. Castle was formerly Miss Dilia Blumberg. The Castle children were Jean, Flora, Ivan, Allen and George. Jean was the wife of Dr. Daniel Campbell, Allen was the husband of Mrs. Pearl Hopson Castle. The George F. Aldrich property was next to the Frank Hagerman property, on the north side. I do not think the Aldrich house was built until about the middle of the '80's. Before the Aldrich home was built the only other houses north of the Hagerman home were the Benjamin Thorne home and the Farm Sherman home. The Sherman home is now a Funeral Home.

The Thorne home became the James property and it was here that Mrs. E.C. James, who was affectionately called "Aunt Delia" by many of the children of the old time Bloomfield residents, spent the later part of her life.

I believe that Ed. James was a relative of "Squire" James. I am almost positive that "Ed" was his son. The Ed James farm was located at the N. E. corner of W. Maple and Lasher Rds. The farm on the north side of the James farm was the property of Mrs. Mary Ann Hunt, and was called the "North farm" by the Hunts. Mrs. Hunt bought this farm with money she earned teaching school. After her death in September 1868 this farm became the property of her son, Chas. G. Hunt. A large oak tree stood just to the south of the Hunt-James property line. I have been told several times that Mr. James drove spikes into the trunk of the tree and remarked that who ever cut down this tree and tried to cut it up, at some future time, would have some job sawing it up.

Mr. and Mrs. George F. Aldrich were the parents of W. Clair and George C. Aldrich. Clair Aldrich worked on the Eccentric when its office was on the 3rd floor of the south end of the Chas. E. Chain store. He also worked on the old Pontiac Gazette at one time.

George F. Aldrich worked for the G. T. R. R. in the Brush St. office in Detroit and was later in the employ of the Nichols and Shepard Co. of East Lansing, Mich. Mr. Aldrich was G. T. R. R. agent for many years and one of his duties was to collect the mail from the post office and take it to the depot. He also received all incoming mail and took it to the post office. He used a large, square, boxed push cart for this purpose. He had a keen sense of humor and had many friends.

Mrs. Aldrich was in ill health for a long time but whenever possible she gave able assistance in the Baptist Church and Sunday school. I believe that Mr. Aldrich was at one time the Supp'l of the Baptist School, and was vitally interested in the Baptist church work.
