

TRACK TEAM EKES OUT WIN

Baldwin Thinedals Cop Dual Meet From Royal Oak As Records Fall

In one of the most thrilling dual meets in which it has competed of recent years, the Baldwin high school track team successfully defended its unblemished season's record and in some measure atoned for the defeats of the basketball and football teams by coming out of Royal Oak high school's track meet, May 12, at 5:15 p. m., Friday, May 8, at Royal Oak. The Acorn squad seized an early lead of nearly 20 points over the Maples, and remained in front all the way through the meet, until after the running of the final event—the relay. The finish of the meet was truly a story-book finish. The score stood 21 to 17, favoring the Acorns, with the relay remaining to be run. The relay was the event that decided the meet, for the five points that Birmingham captured here changed the score to favor the local school. Birmingham took seven firsts, counting the relay. Murray, of Royal Oak, was high point man for the meet, getting ten points by taking first in both dash events. The Maples were minus the services of Don Porteous and Harold Hindling, two consistent point getters, and had those two been in uniform, the meet might have assumed a less close outlook.

Next Saturday, May 16, the Maroons will go to Ypsilanti to compete in the Regional meet. This is the largest meet of the year for the team, outside the State meet, and the boys are looking forward to it with keen expectation. The local team has an excellent chance of becoming Regional champs on the basis of their fine seasonal showing, although
