PLAYERS ORGANIZE UNDER NEW REGIME

George M. Dwellley Elected President At Annual Meeting Friday

Village Players gathered at the Playhouse Friday evening to hold their annual meeting and to inaugurate a new system under a constitution and by-laws recently adopted. As a first innovation under the new order, George M. Dwellley was elected president to succeed Loren T. Robinson, retiring after an administration of two years.

The new constitution provides that the executive shall be elected by the membership instead of appointed by the board as in former years. Previously, a five-man board was elected by the members, which in turn, named officers from its own number.

Under the new regime, the president is elected to serve one year and the treasurer for a three year term by the organization. The new board, composed of seven members and the treasurer, provides for a three-year directorship, a two-year directorship, and four one-year directorships. The president is, of course, a member of the board, though the treasurer is not included. The latter will act as financial advisor, of such matters as he may be called to discuss.

According to the new regulations, Henry Hart was elected treasurer for a three year term, and serving as director for the same length of time, will be Warren Foster, Jr. Paul Neal Averill was elected to the two-year directorship. Those elected for one-year terms are Mrs. Fred H. Englar, Mrs. Clifford H. Ranney, W. F. Heidrich and Rolfe C. Spinning.

The remaining officers, including vice-president, secretary and librarian, will be elected at a meeting of both the new and retiring boards of directors, to be held early in the summer at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robinson on Wimbledon drive.

Fletcher Plant, Jr., is general chairman of the Fair, which will open at 1:30.

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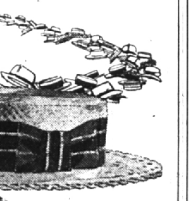
