**Six Classes Open To Child Exhibitors At Flower Show**  
 Birmingham children will receive special recognition in the annual flower show sponsored by the local unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association to be held Wednesday, June 10, at the Community House.  
 Six classes have been arranged particularly for junior exhibitors under the chairmanship of Mrs. Charles H. Welch, Jr.  
 The girls applying to children's exhibitors is that they be between the ages of six and 10 years may have the thrill of setting the party tables according to their own ideas, and entering them in the show. Girls between the ages of 11 and 15 years may also arrange small tables with their own originality as their guide.  
 Two other classes for the same ages provide for miniature arrangements of flowers not exceeding six inches over all.  Other classes include shadow boxes, arrangements of flowers and accessories for occasional tables, and arrangements in which flowers and container are in shades or tones of one color. There will be also the customary classes for specimen blooms and single blooms, miniatures, cut flowers, and arrangements of branches or foliage in various containers.  
 The show will open at 2:30 p. m. and continue until 7 p. m., and all those interested are invited to attend. Exhibits must be entered at the Community House between the hours of 9 a. m. and 12 noon, the day of the show.
