Junior High Thinclads Set Five New Records In Friday's Races A summary of the seventh annual Junior High track and field meet for boys, held at McClellan School on Friday, May 22, is as follows: All of Adams won the 60-yard hurdles for Class B in 7.1 seconds setting a new record. A second race for the same class resulted in Badley of Barnum coming in first with the time of 8.2 seconds. Heter of Baldwin won the 100-yard dash, Class A, in the good time of 11.3 seconds. The world's record for this event is 9.4. The 125-yd. B dash event over the 75-yard distance was won by Thomas of Adams, his time being 9.1. The Class A dash over the same distance was won by Hatt of Barnum in the same time. In the 50-yard dash, Heter of Baldwin again finished in front in the good time of 6.4. Heter of Barnum cupped first in the 100-yard hurdle event, breaking the tape in 13.4 seconds. Gowan of Adams won the Class B shot put event with a heave of 32 feet, three and one-half inches. The Class A event with the shot was captured by Hatt of Barnum, who tossed the weight 42 feet two inches. This was a new school record. The Class A high jump went to McDonald of Baldwin, who crossed the bar at five feet,

Cranbrook Senior Service On Sunday

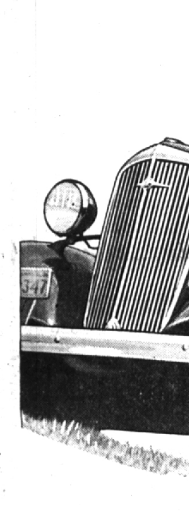
