CAROL ROEHM ON NATIONAL Y BOARD

Hills Woman First In Detroit Area To Win Honor

Miss Carol M. Roehm of Vaughn Road, Bloomfield Hills, former chairman of the Park Branch of the Detroit Y. W. C. A. and a member of the Detroit Y. W. C. A. board of directors for the past 12 years, was elected to the National Board of the Association at its 14th biennial convention in Colorado Springs on May 4.

Miss Roehm is the first woman from metropolitan Detroit to sit on this board which is made up of 120 representative women, 60 of whom live in New York City and environs and the remaining 60 representing various sections of the country.

During the past 12 years, Miss Roehm has given outstanding volunteer service to the Detroit Y. W. C. A. committees including the building committee, which were responsible for construction of the Central and Highland Park branches. She has served also on the business, nominating, salary and wage, finance, personnel, income study, food service, business girls and endorsement committees.

She is chairman of the Metropolitan Business Girls committee.

Miss Roehm is a graduate of Wellesley College, a member of the Wellesley College Alumnae Council and a member of the finance committee of the Women's City Club of Detroit.
